

WHEAT PRICES ON CHICAGO MARKET TAKE DOWN DROP

CHICAGO, Feb. 15.—Wheat prices turned downward today to a moderate extent during the early trading, general selling having developed as a consequence of lower quotations from Liverpool. Opinions were expressed in some quarters that the recent advance in values had been overdone and that further immediate export buying on a large scale was unlikely. On the decline in prices here, however, something of a renewal of lively demand from commission houses was encountered and a fractional upturn in prices ensued.

Opening quotations which varied from half to 1 1/2% lower, with May \$1.37 to \$1.38 and July \$1.20 1/2 to \$1.20 3/4, were followed by a slight additional setback and then by some recovery.

Corn and oats eased down in price a little with wheat. After opening a quarter to 1/2% lower, May 60 1/2 to 60 3/4, the corn market held close to the initial range.

Oats started 1 1/2 to 1 3/4, off 1/4c and later showed a tendency to react. Provisions declined with grain, despite new upturns in the value of hogs.

CHORAL SOCIETY TO BE REORGANIZED

IRRIGATION DREAM OF PIONEER DAYS NEAR REALIZATION

ASHLAND, Feb. 15.—An irrigation dream of the past generation is about to be realized beyond the engineering "blue-print" status. This much-to-be-desired result will be accomplished through the disposal of a large block of bonds by the Talent Irrigation District. For years, the Hyatt Prairie dam has been a term to conjure with, but the summer season of 1922 will probably witness something tangible resulting from the construction of the most important unit of the entire project referred to, the new reservoir site, as to its merits, having been passed upon satisfactorily by state and district experts, supplemented by approval of bond corporations interested in marketing the district's securities. A half dozen or more streams will feed the reservoirs, either indirectly or directly. Among these are included Keene, Emigrant, Bear, and McDonald creeks. The Hyatt Prairie dam on Keene creek will be nearly 50 feet in height, its storage capacity being 15,000 acre feet, and it will be capable of flooding 1000 acres, or from another viewpoint, it will supply 15 acre feet of water to 7000 or more acres of farm lands along its right-of-way, reinforced by nearly 2000 acres served by the McDonald creek system. The east lateral will be 20 miles long, with a capacity varying from 58 second feet at the intake to 10 second feet at the outlet. Over a mile in length will be the limitations of the Keene creek canal, the capacity of which will be 120 second feet. Based on records kept for a number of years by the federal geological survey, the estimates concede that the supply available from these new sources will irrigate 29,000 acres, nearly all under cultivation, on the basis of 54 per cent as applied to diversified crops and 46 per cent included in orchards. The forthcoming season will be a busy one in that locality, as irrigation development on a big scale sometimes rivals that of railroad and highway construction as to extent of activities and number of men employed. Some idea of the scope of this irrigation project may be derived from the circumstance that an original unit of the Pacific Highway, south of town, was abandoned and the road relocated at a higher elevation. In order to be out of reach of impounded waters. Quite an extent of ranch lowlands, including buildings, will also come within the overtopped area, necessitating some right-of-way condemnation proceedings.

NINE MEN HELD IN GRAND JURY PROBE MOVIE LIFE LOSS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—The nine men ordered held for the grand jury in a verdict rendered by the coroner's jury in connection with the Knickerbocker theater disaster January 28, resulted in the loss of 98 lives, were given an opportunity to appear at the district attorney's office today to give bonds.

They were not taken into custody when the verdict was returned last night and District Attorney Peyton Gordon said they would be permitted to remain at liberty under \$5000 bond each. He said the case probably would be presented to the grand jury, which is in session, by the last of this week.

Based on the testimony of scores of witnesses at the inquest, which began nearly a week ago, the coroner's jury found that the collapse of the roof of the motion picture theater was due to "faulty construction" and "indifferent inspection."

Among those ordered held for the grand jury were R. G. Geare, architect for the building; J. H. Ford, engineer who designed the roof structure; Morris Hacker, building inspector when the theater was constructed; and Frank L. Wagner, the builder.
