Postmaster Wm. J. Warner has received notice from the postoffice department at Washington that in accordance with a recent amendment to the postal laws and regulations that in all cases of impassable roads, bad condition of roads, unsafe bridges, dangerous fords, or other obstructions to service on rural routes, that the patrons affected will be advised and a request made of the proper officials that the necessary repairs be made.

If the repairs are not made within a short time, the regulations provide, the postmaster shall report the matter to Washington with recommendation for an amendment of the route to withdraw it from impassable or unsuitable roads. The new regulations also provide that postmasters shall, in a like manner, report every instance where a non-automatic gate is being maintained on any road covered by rural delivery service.
