**COAL STRIKE NO BLOW TO COMMERCE**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—A national strike in the union coal fields can be "maintained" in the United States for several months without serious inconvenience to commerce," according to evidence put before the inter-state commerce commission today.

The commission taking cognizance of threatened stoppage of mining was asked for statistics covering the situation. The resulting report filed today estimated that non-union coal fields have a weekly average production of 65,770 tons on the basis of conditions in 1918.

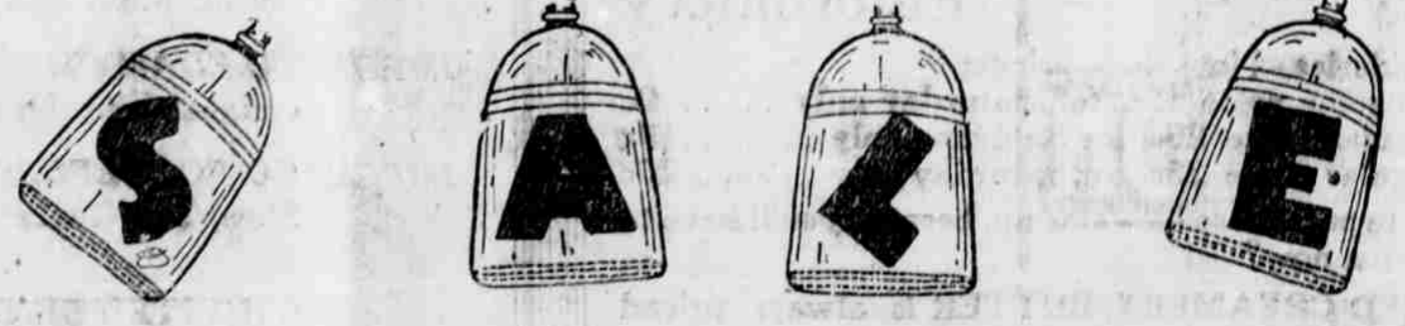
