

186 TREES ASSURED FOR FAIR GROUNDS, EXTEND CAMPAIGN

If there will not be too much of a delay in subscribing for trees to be planted at the county fair grounds, the opportunity to do so remains open for a short time. The campaign has advanced in a most satisfactory manner and considering the fact that no soliciting was done for the purchase of trees, the people of Jackson county have shown a keen interest in improving their property. Fred Champlin of Rogue River has ordered five trees, but no instructions have been received as to the names in which they are to be planted. Chester E. Barr of Dennis, Kimball & Pope asks for three trees to be planted in the names of Chester E. Barr, Jr., Robert E. Lee and Dorothy Lee, all of Medford. Miss Annie Kelleher wishes three trees planted for the following: Wm. J. Sinnott, Joan Sinnott and Elizabeth Sinnott. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kyle of Central Point direct that two trees be named after their sons, Elmer E. Kyle and Robert Floyd Kyle. M. C. Hutton of the Shell Oil Co. has ordered a tree planted for Margaret Hutton. A total of 186 trees are now assured for this year's planting. Two hundred trees was the number which the committee in charge had hopes of getting this year and this number will undoubtedly be secured.

MRS. STOKES WAS VIOLA ATKINSON, WELL KNOWN HERE

An article in this paper last night, under a Reno, Nev., date line, telling of the husband of a former Medford woman being strangled to death near Reno, Nev., stated that no record of the wedding appears in the county books. Mrs. C. H. Williams of 724 West Eleventh street knows the young woman very well and gives the following story: Her name was Viola Atkinson before her marriage. Her mother died here years ago leaving several children whose care fell upon her although she was a mere girl. Her father worked in Whisnant's barber shop. Sergeant Stokes was a sharp shooter and recruiting officer for the army and was stationed here for several weeks, staying at the Holland hotel and at a rooming house on North Holly. He was transferred to Portland, where after a month's stay he returned here and was married to Viola Atkinson by Rev. Bray over a year ago. He left his bride after a week going to San Antonio, Texas, and said he would send money for her to join him later, which he never did, although he wrote her. Mrs. Stokes started to work her way to her husband but took sick at Sacramento. Stokes, upon urgent request, sent her \$25, but never sent money for her to join him. She had never seen him since he deserted her a week after their marriage.

Fuses and Safety A fuse in an electric circuit is a safety device designed to open the circuit at a certain load. Its use is to prevent the wires in the circuit protected from carrying more than their rated capacity and to prevent fires and damage to electrical apparatus. Fuses are placed at various points in the electrical circuits where the wires branch or change size; also at the entrance to the building to protect the wiring in the building, and on the pole outside of the building to protect the transformer and outside circuit. When a fuse blows, there is usually a cause for it, such as an overload or damaged circuit and the cause should be found and repaired before replacing the fuse.
