As is the case with individual income tax returns, corporations are required to file their returns on or before March 15. The time for filing partnership and fiduciary returns, however, has been extended until May 15 but with this exception all income tax returns must be filed not later than March 15 or the delinquent taxpayer will be liable to heavy penalties.


