A vital love interest, without a vamp, a thrilling fight without He-Man chests bared to the mountain breezes—a gripping tale without changing the worn out string of sex. "Tol'able David" has gone, but will not be soon forgotten by the real movie fans in Southern Oregon, for it marks a new and refreshing departure,—replacing reel stuff, with stuff that is real.

Of course, the producers had a good tale to start with, but they have had good tales to start with before, and have killed them dead. The real outstanding achievement in "Tol'able David" lies in holding the camera up to Nature,—showing life as it is,—instead of turning the crank before a mass of papier mache properties, and giving as an excuse "It's what the public wants."

The public don't want it. The public has graduated from the hero who has nothing but his profile as an excuse for living, and from the heroine, who has nothing but a permanent wave above her head, nothing to speak of in it, and little more below it.
