Offutt, day clerk at the Oxford, on reading the reference to John Brown's trial in the Daily Courier of Monday, was reminded of his visit to the scene of the execution. Mr. Offutt's grandfather was a member of the Virginia legislature and attended the Brown trial. The day before the execution he took young Offutt, then a lad of 8 and his mother to view the gallows, which was erected in a field near Charles-Town. The town was full of wild rumors and his mother insisted on being taken home before the execution. Years later Mr. Offutt married the daughter of one of the men guarding John Brown."
