

### OUTDOOR SIGN COMPANY MAY BUILD IN CITY

W. F. Thompson of San Francisco, assistant general manager of the Foster and Kleiser Advertising company was the principal speaker at the Chamber of Commerce forum luncheon at the Hotel Medford this noon.

In beginning his address Mr. Thompson brought in the appropriate subject of the life of George Washington, the modern convenience, the luxuries, the amusements and labor saving devices, the advantages of which our first president was unable to enjoy. He spoke of the numerous inventions since the time of the death of Washington and of the education of the public in the intelligent use of these inventions through the medium of advertising. Aside from religion, he declared, advertising produces the most vivid impression upon the human mind.

Mr. Thompson, before accepting his position in the San Francisco office of the company was a resident of this state for 12 years. He declared that the Foster and Kleiser company had its origin in this state, in that Mr. Kleiser is an Oregon man. Since its institution, 17 years ago the company has grown from a \$10,000 capitalization to a capitalization of \$6,000,000. It has recently purchased the business of Blaine Klum, of this city and the company will soon start in the improvement of its equipment in this district and soon hopes to own its own offices here.

Mr. Thompson, on behalf of his company, proffered assistance to the Chamber of Commerce in the improvement of the city and stated that the company would be glad to assist in any way possible in any movement of advancement.

B. W. Paul, chairman of the meeting expressed the appreciation of the assembly and thanked Mr. Thompson for his address.

Several songs were sung under the leadership of D. E. Millard.

#### CURFEW ORDINANCE PASSED

The signal provided for in this section shall be known as the curfew signal and shall be regarded by all persons as a signal and warning to observe the terms of this ordinance.

"It shall be unlawful for any parent, guardian or other adult having the legal care and custody of any person under the age of 17 years to allow or permit any such person to go upon or be in or upon the streets, alleys, avenues, parks or other public places within the corporate limits of the city of Medford after the hours designated in section 1 of this ordinance except as provided by section one thereof.

"Any policeman, police officer, or peace officer is hereby authorized and empowered by virtue of his office to take charge of any person under the age of 17 years, violating the provisions of this ordinance and for the first violation thereof it shall be the duty of such policeman or other officer taking charge of any such person to take the said person to his home and also to notify the parents or guardians of such person of the violation of the terms of this ordinance. Upon a second or further violation of this ordinance said parents or guardians or those having charge of such person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall upon conviction thereof before the City Court, be fined not less than \$2.00 nor more than \$25 for each and every offense.

#### Women Declare Jazz Bad As Scarlet Vice

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 22.—Enactment of a law prohibiting jazz music and severely punishing those who insist on "perpetrating" it on the public, was advocated here yesterday by the women's club. Declaring that jazz is in the same category as the saloon and scarlet vice the club women asserted it should be punished by a fine and imprisonment.

### BONE HEAD PLAY JEOPARDIZES MANY MILLIONS DAMAGES AGAINST GERMANY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—(By Associated Press.) Treaty provisions for the settlement of claims of American citizens against Germany, aggregating hundreds of millions of dollars, lapsed more than a fortnight ago, it was learned today, and entirely new diplomatic negotiations with Germany may be necessary to pave the way for a settlement.

By the terms of the separate peace treaty with Germany, the United States reserved the right to initiate within 90 days after the exchange of ratifications, a mixed arbitral commission to consider claims arising out of the world war. The ninety day period expired February 9, without the American government having exercised its reserved right.

On March 2, 1921, President Wilson transmitted to the senate data pre-

pared by Secretary Coby regarding claims filed with the department of state by American citizens which showed a total of 1253 claims, filed or in process of filing, with an aggregate value of \$221,231,465.

Department officials said today those figures had remained virtually unchanged.

In addition to claims by Americans, there are various pre-war and war time losses sustained by the government aggregating \$89,334,341, claims for American properties sequestered in Germany amounting to \$191,147,346, and claims for losses sustained by American corporations operating in Roumania when that country was invaded by the German army in 1916. The latter claims aggregate 672,616-713 lei, at a rate of exchange not yet determined.

Washington's time to interpose in other people's quarrels, but stand perfectly ready to cooperate with honest men for a clearly defined honest purpose, and once engaged will do our part as enthusiastically and efficiently as we did in 1917 and 1918."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—A cablegram received here today from Cairo and signed by Wacyn Boltros Ghail, secretary of the Egyptian people's delegation, states that "as the memory of George Washington will always remain dear to all free men, so is the name of the United States always honored for its ideals," in fostering equality between states strong and weak."

Egypt, the "mother of ancient civilization," the cablegram said, "sends with its good wishes our expression of unalterable confidence in the final triumph of justice."
