DAYTON, O., Feb. 22.—John D. Rockefeller, Sr., grandfather of 16-year-old Mathilde McCormick whose engagement to Max Oser, Swiss riding academy proprietor, has been announced by members of the McCormick family, has not given his consent to the match, according to close friends here of Mr. Rockefeller. Mr. Rockefeller is at the Casements, his winter home at Ormond Beach, near here.

Harold F. McCormick, recently divorced by Mr. Rockefeller's daughter, and Miss Mathilde McCormick will visit Mr. Rockefeller at Ormond soon to discuss the proposed marriage. It was said today.

CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—Miss Mathilde McCormick, 16 year old daughter of Harold F. McCormick, president of the International Harvester company, and Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick, has not received the consent of her grandfather, J. D. Rockefeller, Sr., to her marriage with Max Oser, Swiss riding master.

A close friend of the family today made this statement and added that such approval has not even been sought.

PAYS BOY \$1000 TO ROB HOUSE OF \$50,000 JEWELS

LONG BRANCH, N. J., Feb. 22.—(By Associated Press.) Alleging, police say, that he was paid \$1000 by Mrs. Sarah H. Robertson to stage "the holdup" in her home at Deal, last Saturday night in which she claimed to have been robbed of a sandbag containing \$50,000 in jewels, John Bailey, 26, was arrested here today on a charge of conspiracy.

The bag supposed to contain jewels, Bailey said, was in reality filled with white tissue paper and the "weapon" was actually a pipe case. The bag and its contents and the pipe case were turned over to the local police.

Robertson, who claimed to have been robbed of \$50,000 in jewelry last Saturday night and who was implicated by John Bailey in an alleged plot to "fake" the robbery in order to collect burglar insurance on the jewels, was arrested on a charge of conspiracy.

U. S. INCOME TAX EXPERT HERE THIS WEEK, FED'L BLDG.

George G. Hewitt, deputy collector of Internal Revenue, who will be here the remainder of this week only, for the purpose of assisting taxpayers to make their income tax returns for 1921, which must be in the revenue collector's office at Portland on or before March 13th, returned last night from Roseburg, where he addressed the Oregon Retail Merchants' association convention yesterday on "Our Income Tax." Mr. Hewitt's office while here is at Room 287, federal building.

Income tax returns for the year 1921 must be filed by the following: Every individual who had a net income of \$1000 or more, if single, or if married and not living with husband or wife.

Every individual who has a net income of \$2000 or more, if married and living with husband or wife, and every individual who had a gross income of \$5000 or more, regardless of whether or not that sum netted him a cent of profit.

Every married person living with husband or wife, in order to claim the exemption of \$2500 and \$4000 for each dependent, must make a return, although his actual net income for 1921 may have been only \$2000.

WASHINGTON'S POLICY TOWARD WORLD IS POLICY U. S. A. TODAY

BALTIMORE, Feb. 23.—The United States has adopted toward the world the policy of George Washington, "not a policy of dictation, coercion, or imperialism, but of co-operation and of faith in the sanction of the universal conscience of mankind," Vice President Coolidge declared in an address here yesterday at Johns Hopkins university.

America stands ready, he said, "to bear its share of the burdens of the world, but it cannot live the life of other peoples or remove from them the necessity of working out their own destiny."

The willingness of the American people to make sacrifices for the welfare of the world, the vice-president said, is shown by the policy pursued by their government in calling the Washington conference and particularly its proposal for the reduction of naval armaments, which he said was "the voice of the people" and not "one man, one party or one administration."

TWO PIONEER RESIDENTS OF VALLEY PASS ON

Harriett Altee Hurley died at her home five miles west of Medford in the West Side district, from diabetes yesterday.

Mrs. Hurley was the wife of James M. Hurley one of the appraisers of the Federal Farm loan, and was born in Fulton county, Illinois, February 12, 1859, being married to James M. Hurley at Havana, Illinois, Dec. 21, 1876. The family have been residents of the West Side district for two years. Deceased leaves her husband, two sons, two daughters and one adopted daughter, Mrs. Dora Hesselgrave and Mrs. George March of Central Point, Ore., John B. Hurley, Hornbrook, Cal., Irwin L. Hurley, Dunsmuir, Cal., and Miss Ina Hurley, Medford, and four grand children.

Mrs. Hurley was a devoted wife and mother and leaves a host of friends to mourn her loss.

The funeral services will be held at the Pearl Funeral Home Friday, February 24, at 2:30 p. m., Rev. D. E. Millard officiating. Interment in Central Point cemetery.

ANOTHER SUSPECT IN MOVIE MURDER CASE ARRESTED

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Feb. 23.—Governor Stephens today issued a requisition on the state of Arizona for the return of Harold Burdick, H. Paula and Jean Dubane from Winslow, Ariz., to Long Beach, where they are charged with robbery.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 23.—City Marshal Enoch Wilson of Winslow, Ariz., today telegraphed Sheriff William J. Traver of Los Angeles county that he believed Jean Dubane, in custody at Winslow, could give valuable information concerning the recent murder here of William Desmond Taylor, film director.

Officers from Long Beach were due in Winslow tomorrow to bring back Dubane and two companions charged with the theft of a costly automobile from a rental company at the beach city.

Marshal Wilson telegraphed that Dubane had commented on the "clean get-away" of the chauffeur who presumably drove the murderer to the place of the shooting and that he had claimed to be acquainted with Edward F. Sands, sought in connection with the Taylor case.

Dubane told Winslow officers that he left here February 1. The Taylor murder occurred February 1 in the evening.

U. S. Navy Wants No German Zeppelin

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The navy department, it was learned from officials today has notified the state department that it does not want the German Zeppelins now being constructed for the United States by Germany under the reparations clause of the treaty of Versailles, unless it comes to America without cost.

The question has arisen, it was said, as to whether the amount of money allotted for this purpose by the allies under the reparations agreement to the United States was sufficient to complete the Zeppelins.

COLD WAVE STILL GRIPS MID-WEST, BLIZZARD RAGES

CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—The cold wave that has held the whole northwest in its grip for more than 24 hours continued there today and spread through Iowa, Missouri, Oklahoma, Kansas and north Texas, as well as east of the Mississippi river.

The drop in temperature was felt early today in Chicago and the mercury kept sinking as the day advanced. By tonight the thermometer was expected to be hovering above the ten above zero mark, according to weather bureau forecasts.

Illinois and Indiana which reported high temperatures yesterday also were beginning to feel the cold snap today.

In Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and northern Texas the warm, soaking rains of yesterday had turned to sleet today with the temperature below freezing.

In the northwest temperatures continued to fall with the mark reaching from 5 to 12 below zero in Minnesota and the Dakotas.

Train schedules and wire communication were still seriously interrupted. One death was reported at Rochester, Minn., through a short-circuited electric wire due to the storm.

Northern and southern Minnesota were in the grip of the blizzard as was western Wisconsin.

Many trains running out of Minneapolis and St. Paul were three to four hours late and several were reported stalled in drifts.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Feb. 23.—Blizzard conditions prevailed again early today throughout the northwest. Sweeping in from the Rocky Mountain regions the storm which began Tuesday night was rapidly moving eastward today.

Winds ranging from 50 to 60 miles an hour swept the snow in the Dakotas into huge drifts. Duluth, with nearly 30 inches of snow, reported drifts in many places more than 20 feet high.

Most trains out of Duluth were cancelled.
