Range horses are dying by the hundreds in Crook and Deschutes counties, where the natural forage is buried under a foot of crusty snow, says Elmer Williams of the predatory animal division of the United States biological survey. Cattle and sheep are doing well with plenty of feed in spite of an unusually cold winter, but no attempt is made whatever to feed the range horses. In the Paulina country, according to Williams, range horses have always wintered out; they are not considered worth feeding, and often sell as low as \$2 or \$3 a head; and the people, therefore, are allowing them to starve to death this winter.

## MEDFORD SERVICE STATION SOLD TO ASSOCIATED OIL

The gas and oil department of the Medford Service station, C. C. Furnas and Paul B. McDonald, president and secretary and owners, has been sold to the Associated Oil Co. The company having purchased the service station building, all the equipment and having secured a lease on the lot from Furnas and McDonald for a number of years.

This sale has been made that the Medford Service station owners might devote all their time and effort to the tire and accessory business alone. This business has grown to such an extent that it demands their entire attention. They will continue this business in the brick building adjoining the service station as in the past.

The Medford Service Station Inc. was the first service station in this city, having been erected and having gone into business in January, 1919. Since that time the business has grown due to the service rendered and to the quality of the products.

The Associated Oil company will take charge tomorrow, March 2, and in the very near future will construct upon the site of the present station at the corner of Main and Riverside, a fabricated steel service station which type has been adopted and standardized by the Associated Oil company. Complete concrete driveways will also be laid and a number of additional modern improvements made.
