Rev. J. R. Sankitt pronounced the invocation, while Prof. Irving Vining was the speaker of the evening and delivered one of his characteristically brilliant addresses.

Carter Amuses Audience. E. V. Carter of Ashland, gave an interesting and amusing speech telling several incidents which he had encountered during his experience as a hunter in southern Oregon.

Louis Bean Speaks. The Hon. Louis E. Bean, speaker of the house in the state legislature and candidate for the republican nomination for governor followed Mr. Carter and told of the fight for the passage of the Rogue River fish bill in the legislature in 1917.
