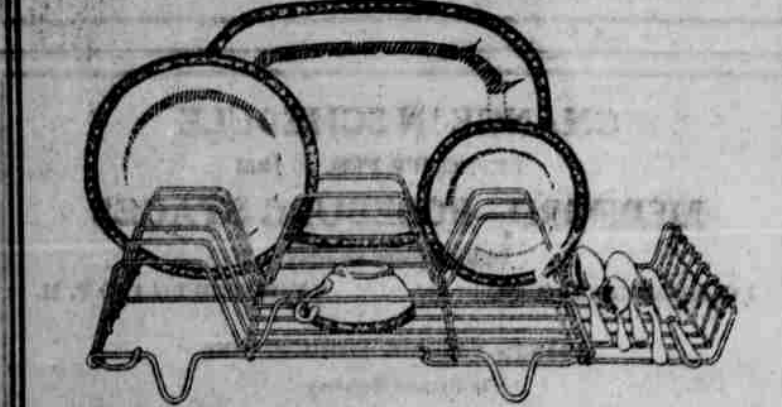

A. COWAN BOUND OVER TO G. JURY, ASSAULT CHARGE

A Cowan was bound over to the grand jury yesterday afternoon in Justice Taylor's court after a preliminary hearing on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon on the person of Al Clement. Several of the men employed in the Medford Concrete Construction plant appeared as witnesses, but none of them saw Cowan strike Clement. It is alleged that Cowan struck Clement with a heavy metal floor scraper while Clement was not looking. Cowan contends that he struck in self defense. He alleges that after he was discharged he went up to Clement and said, "Think you've done something smart, don't you, you big sucker?" He alleges that Clement struck at him and then picked up a piece of iron with which to strike again. He says that he then seized the scraper and struck Clement with it in self defense. He declared that he did not run after the fight but could not explain his failure to return to his home in Central Point to the satisfaction of the court. The court considered the evidence sufficient to warrant the binding over of the defendant to the grand jury on \$500 bonds.

N. Y. Society Woman At Slicker Hearing Becomes Hysterical

NEW YORK.—At the end of a dramatic session in which a witness, Mrs. Dorothy Atwood, New York society woman, became hysterical and interrupted the proceedings, the grand jury today returned an indictment charging first degree grand larceny against Alfred Lindsay, a stockbroker. Lindsay's operations among wealthy men and women are alleged to have netted him \$700,000. He was indicted on the charge of Mrs. W. H. Arnold, who testified she gave him \$17,000 on December 19 which was to have been invested in a supposed pool to buy stock. Mrs. Lillian Duke, divorced wife of the "tobacco king" testified that she lost \$375,000 in her dealings with Lindsay. Three killed Egyptian riots. LONDON, Mar. 2.—(By the Associated Press)—Three persons were killed and 24 others injured, some seriously in a disturbance this morning at Tanta, Egypt, 55 miles north of Cairo, says a Central News dispatch from Cairo. Native soldiers quelled the disturbance and restored order.

BROKER FAILURES NOW TOTAL 50

NEW YORK, Mar. 3.—The list of Wall street brokerage house failures climbed toward the fifty mark today. Scott and Stump, a consolidated exchange house, went into bankruptcy shortly after the market opened, and a short time later Alphonse Deschamps, successor to Friedman, Markelsohn and company, announced an assignment. Friedman, Markelsohn and company recently suspended operations and the three partners were arrested on charges of grand larceny preferred by Deschamps who also instituted civil action to recover \$16,000. An involuntary petition in bankruptcy without an estimate of liabilities or assets was filed against M. E. and J. W. DeAgostis, Broadway stock brokers.

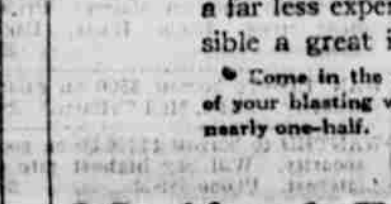
