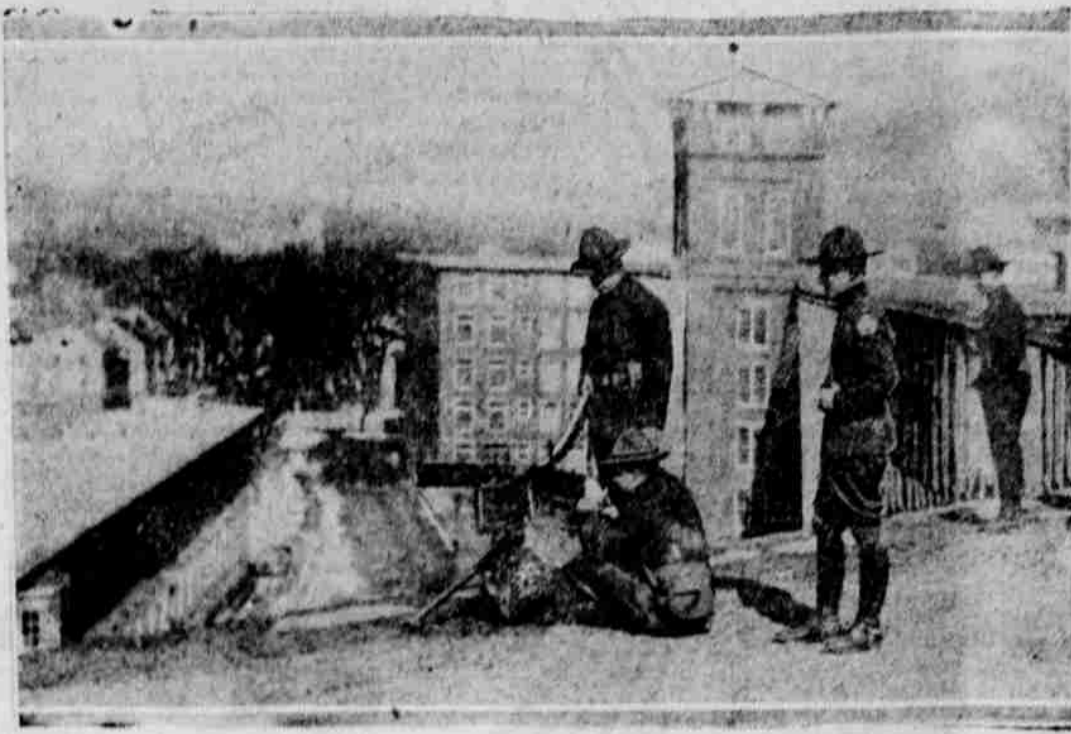

Machine Guns Quell Strike Rioters



HOPE, R. I., March 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—A few broken heads remained today as souvenirs of yesterday's first attempt to reopen cotton mills closed by the strike nearly six weeks ago in the Pawtucket and Blackstone valleys where nearly 17,000 textile workers are out. The experiment followed refusal of both mill owners and strikers to submit their differences to the chairman of the state board of mediation and conciliation. Manufacturers maintained that a large percentage of the operatives desired to work at the 20 per cent reduction in the wages and the increased working schedule offered them.

Twenty-four workers in all out of a working force of 200 ran the gauntlet to get to the plant yesterday.

BIG BASKETBALL SERIES OF SEASON TO START TONIGHT

The first game of the Medford-Ashland four game basketball series will be played at the Ashland high school tonight. These annual series are always an especially interesting and hotly contested set of games. More spirit and genuine rivalry is shown during these series than in any other games of the season and this year promises to be no exception.

The second game of the series will be played in this city tomorrow night and it is rumored that the high school basketball team has arranged for a bonfire and rally before the game.

If the high school floor is used, signals instead of being given by an unraised hand at the tip-off will be given by regular and irregular jabs in the ribs from one player to another, as all will be within easy reach of each other.

Reports from Ashland enthusiasts carry the information that the Ashland team is in the best of shape and that Guthrie and Heer are going strong.

The Medford team is in better shape this week than when they played Roseburg and although not much comment is to be heard from members of the team or student body, the best fight of the season seems certain. Basketball enthusiasts about town say that they are unable to determine whether the silence is in the student ranks is diffidence or grim determination, but that they like to think it is the latter.

N. Y. Stock Exchange Firm Fails, Broker Collapse Continues

NEW YORK, March 3.—The whirlpool of misfortune continued to drag down brokerage houses today. The failure of George W. Kendrick, III., and company of Philadelphia was announced from the rostrum of the New York Stock Exchange and the Consolidated Stock Exchange announced the suspension of Charles A. Bertrand of C. A. Bertrand and company of this city.

An involuntary bankruptcy petition against C. A. Bertrand and company was filed in federal court. No estimate was made of liabilities and assets.

PHILADELPHIA, March 3.—An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed in the United States district court today against L. A. Gerson and company, stockbrokers. No statement of liabilities was filed but counsel for creditors said they would amount to \$125,000 and assets to about \$55,000.

Now Is Time for Dormant Spray

Dormant spray with lime and sulphur should be applied just as soon as possible on pears and peaches. If this spray is applied before the buds begin to swell it will control pear leaf blister mite and San Jose scale in the pears, and peach leaf curl on the peaches. This should be applied at the regular dormant strength. Lime and sulphur test 36 degrees Beaume diluted one gallon lime and sulphur to eight gallons of water.

Apple spray for the control of San Jose scale and aphid can be applied a little later with better results, especially for the aphid. This dormant spray on apples can be applied even after the leaves begin to show, without material danger to the apple trees.

It is important that pears and peaches be sprayed immediately and owners of these varieties ought to be busy every day that it is possible to get on the soil.

If dry lime and sulphur is to be used as a substitute for the liquid, use 15 pounds to fifty gallons of water. Either oil emulsion one gallon to 100 gallons or one pound of casein to 100 gallons of the diluted spray may be used to an advantage as a spreader. And would recommend that a spreader be used where San Jose scale has had a good start.
