

BODY OF MEDFORD WAR HERO WILL ARRIVE SATURDAY

The body of Lester Henry Jacobs, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Jacobs, who was killed in action at Soissons sector July 19, 1918, will arrive in Medford Saturday at 9:17 a. m. Lester was born in Mornan Hill, California, Sept. 1, 1889, and moved to Medford in 1907, and to Rogue River in 1910. He graduated from Shedd, Oregon, high school in 1916, and returned to Medford in 1916, becoming interested in the Bungalow store on North Riverside, owned by his father.

Lester enlisted in the Marine Corps, May, 1917, and trained at Mare Island until September, 1917, when he was assigned to U. S. S. Buffalo, and patrolled the Pacific waters. He then passed through Panama canal and arrived at Quantico, Va., in November, 1917, where he was assigned to U. S. S. Hancock, and patrolled the Gulf of Mexico during the submarine scare. Then ordered to Fort Crockett, Texas in December, 1917, and was assigned to 109th Co. 8th Regiment Marines, where he won expert rifleman medal in 1917 and double bar expert medal in 1918.

Early in May, 1918, he was ordered to France, arriving there about May 20th, 1918, and went into action June 6th, 1918 at Belleau Woods, being killed in action at Soissons sector July 19, 1918.

Deceased was 33 years, 10 months, 18 days old at his death. The funeral services will be held at the Perl Funeral Home Saturday at 2:30 p. m. Judge O. H. Gilmore of Rogue river will deliver the obituary and address and Rev. J. B. Sarnett the sermon.

Six marines will act as active-pall bearers, and six American Legion men as honorary pall bearers. The firing squad will be composed of sailors. Private Carl G. Danham and Thomas J. Morgan are buried in adjoining lots. Interment in I. O. O. F. cemetery.
