TRY EXPERIMENT OF DRY DREDGING AT ROGUE RIVER

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Mar. 4.—Experimental work of a "dry land" dredging method is being carried out on an extensive scale a quarter of a mile east of the town of Rogue River, nine miles east of Grants Pass. Principles heretofore attached only to dredging have been adapted by J. S. Taylor, in charge of the work, and are being put into practical use as rapidly as possible. Some machinery is at hand, and lumber is being received every day for construction purposes.

Under Mr. Taylor's plan the land will receive practically the same treatment accorded under dredging. A long drag line, attached to an electrically equipped hoist, 80 feet high, will carry a bucket of one-year capacity to all points within a 600-foot radius. The sand and gravel then will be screened, and the coarser material sent through a hopper, reducing it to a sand. All magnetic properties in the sand will be removed. It is estimated that a 40 per cent waste of free gold, under dredging and placer methods, will be eliminated.

Title to 525 acres, lying in a strip four and one-half miles long, with a width of but a few hundred yards at the widest places, has been obtained. The tract lies between the main line of the Southern Pacific railway and the Rogue river, and is believed to be an ancient channel of the river. The cost of acquiring the land is said to be \$100,000.

Missionary Christian Church Is Murdered

ST. LOUIS, Mar. 4.—The Rev. Dr. A. L. Shelton, medical missionary of the Disciples of Christ (Christian church) in Tibet, was murdered by robbers near Batang February 17, according to a cablegram received by the United Christian Missionary society here today. Dr. Shelton escaped from a brigand camp in China in June, 1920 after having been kidnapped and held for ransom for sixty days.

The cablegram came from the Rev. Dr. William M. Hardy, also a medical missionary in China and read: "Robbers killed Shelton near Batang, February 17. Notify girls." The girls referred to are Dr. Shelton's daughters, Dorothy, 17, and Doris, 15, who are attending school in Pomona, Cal.
