

# FAVOR PLACING RADIOPHONE AS PUBLIC UTILITY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10.—Allocation of 20 wave lengths among the various classes of wireless telephony senders and government control of establishment of all wireless transmitting telephone stations are recommended by the three committees of the government radio conference made public today.

The recommendations do not provide for government control of receiving stations which Secretary Hoover has said have increased by the hundreds of thousands in the last few months. Amateur transmitting stations would be given exclusive use of wave lengths from 150 to 200 meters and share with the technical and training schools wave lengths from 200 to 250 meters.

Other recommendations are that wave lengths below 6000 meters should in a general way be reserved for radio telephone service, but that those wave lengths which have been fixed for telegraph service within this range, such as S. O. S. signals, shall be retained.

The committee's report expresses "the hope and expectation that the radio telephone may ultimately keep the whole range from zero to 6000 meters."

The committees further urge that the time limit assigned to the different transmitting stations for the various services be placed under the control of the commerce department and also that the radio telephone be increased to the status of a public utility.

Mrs. Obenchain later was in Los Angeles and returned to Chicago October 7, upon which date she sent the following telegram to Kennedy:

"Am certain will get annulment this month. Please come this month or sooner if you can."

She said that this meant that she expected Kennedy to go to Chicago to marry her. His answer was that he was seriously ill, she testified.

## DE VALERA BLAMED FOR DISTURBANCES LIMERICK, IRELAND

DUBLIN, Mar. 10.—(By Associated Press.) Eamon DeValera, the former president, declared today he would have no statement in answer to that of Arthur Griffith, president of the Dail Eireann, on the Limerick situation until such time as the controversy would not embarrass the difficult position.

Mr. Griffith's statement issued last night declared the situation in Limerick was "largely the outcome of incident to indiscipline, indulged or connived at by some of Eamon DeValera's supporters."

He added: "If Mr. DeValera even now will condemn the mutiny in the army, the danger of the situation in Limerick will be materially lessened."

## ANNOUNCE COAST TRAINING CAMPS

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 10.—A schedule of training camps for officers and enlisted men of the organized reserves and the citizens' military training camps of the ninth corps area, issued today at the Presidio by Major General Charles G. ## PRESIDENT TAKES HOUSE BOAT TRIP AFTER GOLF GAME

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla., Mar. 10.—(By the Associated Press)—After a round of golf, President Harding and his Florida vacation party shortly after noon today went aboard the houseboat of Edward B. McLean, Washington publisher, for a cruise down the coast.

The presidential party, which includes Mrs. Harding, Attorney General Daugherty, Under Secretary Fletcher of the state department, Speaker Gillett, Secretary Christian and Brigadier General Sawyer, plans to proceed as far as Matanzas Inlet, 22 1/2 miles below St. Augustine. There the night will be spent and the return to Daytona made so as to get in another game of golf tomorrow.

Secretary Christian took a large amount of correspondence aboard the boat, expecting to spend a portion of the afternoon at work.

The president's departure brought a large crowd to the dock.

Secretary Weeks, who came to St. Augustine from Miami, where he is spending a vacation, did not accompany the presidential party on the houseboat cruise, but will remain here until the party returns early next week.

## House in Flip-Flop Votes \$1,000,000 for Seed in Northwest

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10.—By a vote of 99 to 82, the house today passed a bill authorizing a \$1,000,000 appropriation for the purchase of seed grain for farmers in drought stricken areas of the northwest. As previously approved by the senate the bill carried a \$5,000,000 appropriation and the difference as to the size of the appropriation must be compensated before the measure goes to the president. The money will be spent in Washington and Idaho principally.
