## BANKER RELEASED ON HABEAS CORPUS

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 11.—Jafet Lindeberg, capitalist, was released on habeas corpus today from a warrant to extradite him to Tacoma to answer charges in connection with the failure of the Scandinavian-American bank. The warrant was ordered quashed by the court and Lindeberg released from custody.

The court held that the information against Lindeberg did not set forth an extraditable offense. The warrant charged the commission of a fraud by Lindeberg, in that he advertised the resources of the bank in an effort to show that it was solvent. Counsel for Lindeberg denied such advertising and the court held there was not sufficient showing to substantiate the charge.

## GREEK CABINET DEFEATED ON ALLIED ISSUE

LONDON, March 11.—According to a message received by Reuters from a Greek semi-official source the cabinet of Premier Gounaris will resign as a result of the adverse vote yesterday in the chamber of deputies.

ATHENS, March 11.—The government suffered a defeat in the chamber of deputies yesterday, when Premier Gounaris was refused a vote of confidence the vote being 161 to 156.

Premier Gounaris, prior to the vote explained in the assembly the outcome of his negotiations during his recent trip to London, Paris and Rome.

He stated that, as the allies desired to establish peace in the Near East, he had accepted their mediation on condition the allies agreed regarding the peace terms.

Greece must therefore await the results of the Paris conference on Near Eastern questions.

M. Gounaris told the chamber of deputies that negotiations for a loan to Greece were well advanced and only awaited action by the international finance commission and also the consent of America. He then moved the vote of confidence.
