

RED CROSS REPORT  
FEBRUARY SHOWS  
GOOD WORK DONE

The report for the month of February, of Miss Hart, the secretary in charge of the Red Cross work, was submitted to the executive board at their regular meeting on Friday. It shows a broad field covered and much work accomplished for the county and the Red Cross. Many county cases which are isolated until better road conditions, will be investigated later. Full reports in writing are submitted to the court on cases investigated and are kept on file for reference. It is expected that much money will be saved the county as the result of these trained-worker investigations.

Miss Hart's report in full is as follows:

(g) 2 wanted information about the Oregon bonus.

2-29 disabled ex-service men; (a) 6 hospitalization cases; (b) 4 about their bonus claims; (c) 3 for re-examination for compensation; (d) 2 seeking to be transferred to other districts; (e) 1 regarding stopping of his insurance compensation; (f) 1 waiting money from his people.

(b) 112 civilian cases.

1-81 calls for employment; (a) 39 women; (b) 61 men.

2-19 calls for help; (a) 11 wanting women to work; (b) 8 wanting men to work.

3-19 people placed; (a) 6 permanent places; (b) 13 temporary places.

(c) 17 cases investigated for the county; (a) 1 case recommending that the pension not be given; (b) 3 cases of desertion; (c) 2 given cases already on the lists; (d) 4 letters written to relations; (e) 1 answer from relations; (f) 2 ads run in the Medford Mail Tribune, to get men started, one to sell wood, the other to get metal work.

To meet this need the office will only be open mornings Monday and Wednesday from 9 till 12. Afternoons daily (except Wednesday) from 1:30 to 5:30.
