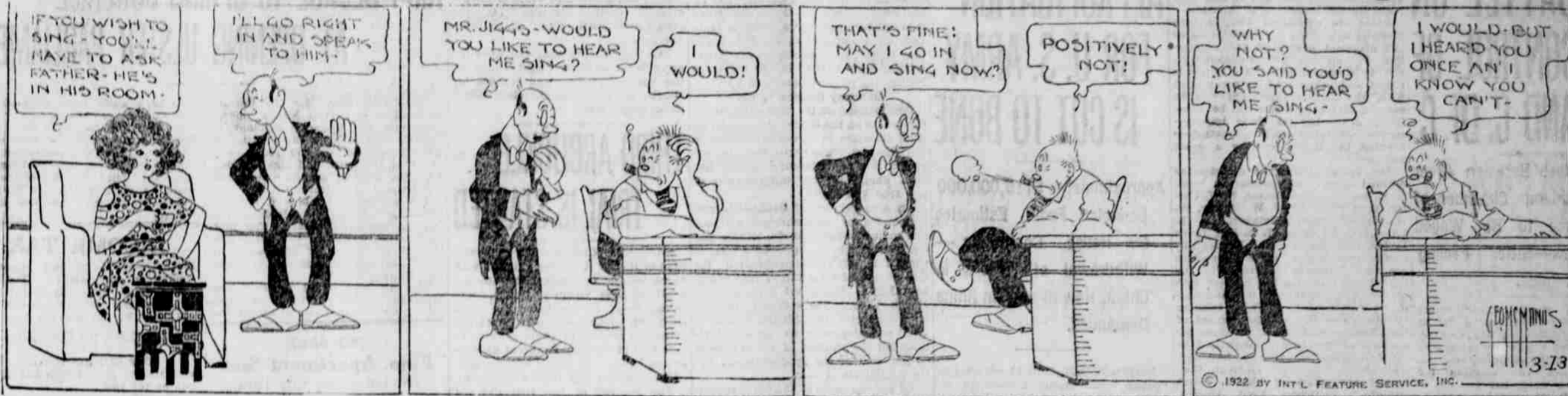

MRS. OBENCHAIN ENDS TESTIMONY, CLOSING STARTS

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 13.—The cross examination of Mrs. Madalene Obenchain, on trial charged with the murder of J. Irlon Kennedy, her sweet heart, was resumed today in the superior court here. Deputy District Attorney Keys began questioning Mrs. Obenchain concerning occurrences on the afternoon and evening of August 5 last.

On direct examination the defendant said she went driving with Kennedy late in the afternoon and after staying until after dark at a beach resort, they went to Kennedy's cottage at Beverly Glen. Kennedy was slain about nine o'clock that night, in front of this cottage. Mrs. Obenchain declared two unknown men rushed past her after shots were fired at her companion.

The prosecution contends the shooting was done by Arthur C. Burch, co-defendant in the case.

Keys led Mrs. Obenchain in detail over the events concerning the shooting of Kennedy. She testified that he had a gun in his hand when he got out of the automobile, and also when he reached the top of the steps where the shooting occurred.

A stranger's voice, a shot and cries of "good night, Mazyln," from Kennedy was her description of the murder. She explained that the words "good night" were an exclamation of surprise in the slang usage and not of parting. She said that in walking down the steps she stepped over the body in order to get to a position to pick him up. She saw a man on the ground at that time, she said.

Mrs. Obenchain was pale and drawn when she faced the prosecutor. She was dismissed from the witness stand following the completion of the state's cross-examination, no questions being asked by her counsel on re-direct examination. Attorneys for the defense told the court they were ready to rest their case following the testimony of one more witness.

As attorneys for the state have asserted that the rebuttal evidence would be brief, it is expected that arguments in this case would commence late today.

WOOD RAT ROBS JEWELRY STORE

The jewelry store of John W. Johnson was burglarized Sunday night, the marauder gaining entrance through a hole in the floor, and making away with a lady's bracelet, a man's gold ring, and \$5 worth of gold solder.
