LIBERAL FEEDING FOR DAIRY COWS, SAYS PROF. FITTS

Good cows, well fed and well handled, always have and always will furnish the best market for hay and grain, said Prof. Fitts of O. A. C., speaking recently before the local dairymen at Geo. Hilton's. Professor Fitts also spoke of the splendid opportunities for dairymen in the Rogue River valley. "Milk is a substance composed of certain materials always put together in the same way. Therefore these materials must be supplied to the cow in these proportions, in the form of a properly balanced ration."

Prof. Fitts advised liberal feeding, as the dairymen's profit comes from the amount of food above the maintenance requirements of the cow. Poor condition of cows is caused by feeding rations which are out of balance.

"Testing associations have brought about marked improvement in the herds of Tillamook county. The standards have been raised and dairymen there never think of quitting the testing work," said Prof. Fitts. They have the records of generations of cows, and the work has proven profitable.

C. C. Dickson of Hood advised the formation of feed sheds in the valley because they permit the purchase of better bulls than the individual farmer can afford. After many years of experience with dairy cows he has decided that the testing association records are the only means of picking good cows.

Keep Water Supply Pure; Forum Topic

The prospects of developing a community without schools or churches are very slim. Likewise, a community cannot hope to grow if its water supply is inadequate or impure.

Medford has good schools and churches and its water is of the very best, yet there is a community obligation that every resident has to guard the purity of the water supply for future generations.
