

NEW INVENTION FOR TAKING PINS FROM STOMACH

PHILADELPHIA, March.—Publicity attached to the recent successful operation on a little Kansas City girl here for the removal of a pin from her bronchus, has drawn attention to a curious surgical instrument, invented for such a purpose.

The bronchoscope appears simple enough to the eye. Roughly, it is a straight metal tube, more than one-quarter of an inch in diameter and about 15 1-2 inches long. A tiny wire runs down the tube and there is an electric light at the bottom which enables the surgeon to see into the interior of the lungs, bronchus or stomach.

Among various objects that have been removed from the lungs or stomachs of patients in this city are safety pins, common pins, hat pins, false teeth, tacks, sewing needles, staples, hypodermic needles, coins and watch charms.
