

PLESIOSAURUS? NOT AT ALL, ITS A GLYPTODON

Director Buenos Aires Zoo Issues Statement on Dis- covery of Prehistoric Animal Swimming in Andean Lake —Dates Back Million Years.

BUENOS AIRES, Mar. 15.—(By Associated Press.) It was not a plesiosaurus that was seen swimming in an Andean lake recently but probably a descendant either of the horny plated glyptodon or of the megatherium, in the opinion of Professor Onelli, director of the Buenos Aires zoo.

"Plesiosaurus is a pseudonym that newspapers have given it, and which has stuck," he said, "but I believe it is a huge animal of the Edentate family of which ancient remains, not fossil, mark you, were found in Patagonia in 1897 and one of which was fired upon and hit by the explorer, Ramon Lista in 1890 without hurting it."

He explained that, while the plesiosaurus dated back ten million years, the edentates such as the glyptodon and megatherium belonged to the quaternary era of only a million years ago. He said that from 1890 to the present time there had been twelve places in Patagonia between latitudes 39 and 52 at which mysterious creatures were reported to have been seen. These he believes, constitute a few survivors of the genus which existed in the pleistocene period.

Professor Onelli said he had been obliged to postpone the start of the expedition for another week, as a total of 7000 pesos was needed of which 3000 were yet lacking.

The glyptodon was a creature resembling the armadillo and which attained the size of an ox. It had strong limbs with short, broad feet.

The megatherium was a gigantic sloth-like edentate, from 18 to 20 feet in length. It had a short neck, heavy body and powerful tail and hind legs. With its strong, prehensile tongue it tore from trees and shrubs the leaves and twigs upon which it subsisted.

WOMAN JURY GIVES BOOTLEGGER LIMIT

EVERETT, Wash., Mar. 15.—William Alexander, accused of manufacture and possession of an intoxicant, was tried in justice court here today before a jury of six women. The jury appeared to think that Alexander was guilty for what he wanted to assess a fine beyond the maximum and after retiring for the second time brought in a verdict of guilty, \$500 fine on the two counts and a year in jail. Alexander, if he serves out his fine in addition to his jail sentence will spend almost two years behind the bars. He asked for a trial by jury and declined to have an attorney defend him.

Auction Off Booze On Detroit Streets

DETROIT, Mich., Mar. 15.—Five men were in custody as a result of an attempt to hold a public liquor auction in Lenox avenue last night.

More than 1200 quarts of liquor were confiscated when the officers descended on the scene and scattered several scores of the bidders. Few provisions for secrecy had been made the auctioneer standing on the foot-board of an automobile in which the liquor was hauled. Lively bidding was in progress when the police interrupted the sale, they reported.

PLAN TO BUILD RESORT HOTEL DIAMOND LAKE

Forest Service Asks Bids for Structure to Be Completed By July 1, 1923—H. M. Albright of Park Service, Urges Inclusion in Park.

PORTLAND, Mar. 16.—Recreational development of the Diamond lake area by the United States forest service, already begun by the building of automobile roads from the lake to Crater Lake National park boundary, and contemplated road projects from Crescent lake, received an impetus in the announcement Monday by Assistant District Forester C. J. Buck of the advertisement for bids for the construction of a summer resort at Diamond lake.

To Build Rowboats
The resort will involve a minimum expenditure of \$12,950 before July 1, 1924. The lease will be for a period of 15 years, with certain specified constructions required for the first three years. The annual lease will be \$25, and will call for a resort building, lobby, dining room, kitchen, store building, gasoline station, pressure water system, sanitation system, bath houses, boat house, pier, cottages and boats.

On or before July 15, 12 serviceable rowboats must be built, estimated to cost \$400, a gasoline station and store building at \$1500 and toilets at \$200.

By July 1, 1923, the main resort building must be constructed at a cost estimated at \$5000, a pressure system and sanitation system at \$1500, a bath house, boat house and pier and 10 additional boats.

By July 1, 1924, six cottages, not including those built by the permittee for his employees, must be constructed at a cost of \$3000.

Will Regulate Charges
All applications for permits must be made to the supervisor of the Umpqua national forest at Roseburg, not later than April 10. Applications will be reviewed and the lease will be given to the one who presents the best proposition from the public standpoint, providing proper financial standing is shown.

The forest service proposes to regulate the charges to the public.

"Crater Lake five years from now will be the same as it is today. It won't have any more visitors. It won't be any more famous. It won't represent any greater asset to Oregon and the nation," said Horace Marden Albright, field assistant to Stephen T. Mather, head of the national park service, "unless the Diamond Lake area is added to Crater lake national park."

Albright, who is also superintendent of Yellowstone national park, was in Portland Tuesday, in conference with George G. Goodwin, chief assistant engineer of the national park service, who has headquarters here.

Reasons Must Be Strong
"The national park service does not act in the creation of national parks or in the expansion of their areas without the very strongest reason," said Superintendent Albright. "We rejected proposals to designate Mt. Baker and Mt. Adams in Washington as national parks."

"A national park must contain some great spectacle. The Grand Canyon is such a spectacle. There is only one Yellowstone. There is only one Crater lake. It is a world wonder. But at the present time there is only the lake to see. Visitors come, look and go on their way. Only a small percentage of those who visit the lake register at the hotel. It is a situation which renders it extremely difficult for the park service to arrange for concessionaires to give satisfactory hotel service."

Mountain Playground
"With Diamond lake area added, including the lake, Mt. Bailey and Mt. Thielsen, we will add to Crater lake park a magnificent mountain playground. Children can wade a hundred yards into the lake without getting beyond their depth. The fishing is excellent. Camp sites are numerous and

attractive. Mountain climbing is thrilling. To add the Diamond lake area will not injure possible power development. The lake is not particularly important from a power standpoint. of the burned district but would have

afforded but little protection had the wind veered the sweep of the flames toward the retail business section to the east.

Bank Is Scorched

Heat from the burning buildings across the street cracked out the windows of the Mercantile Trust and Savings bank before the Burlington building itself was afire.

A heavy police guard was thrown about the bank building but it was driven away quickly when the building caught fire. Cash and securities valued at approximately \$6,000,000 are said to be in the bank vaults and it may be several days before they can be examined.

The Burlington building caught fire at about the eighth story and burned up and down. No streams of water were powerful enough to fight the fire in the upper stories.

The flames leaping high and puffed by the gusts of wind were visible for more than twenty miles.

The Van Buren street tunnel of the Chicago surface lines, under the Chicago river, debouches just at the burned area and for hours the streams of water poured into the tunnel until it was filled to street level.

The Union depot mail terminal was not reached by the flames but postal employees hurriedly removed all mail when it appeared that the fire district could not be restricted.

25,000 Jobs
The new Burlington building withstood a heat so terrific that the fire escape on the side facing the flames

across the street became red hot and bent of its own weight. The ornamental tile on the building crumbled in the heat and the hot blast, breaking through the windows, destroyed the interior decorations in many rooms and wiped out everything made of wood.

It was estimated that more than 25,000 persons were made jobless through the fire.

Big Fire in Hoboken.

HOBOKEN, N. J., March 15.—Fire early today destroyed a business structure, a five story tenement and eight garages. Early estimates placed the loss at \$200,000.

CARRUTHERSVILLE, Mo., March 15.

Fire of undetermined origin today virtually wiped out an entire business block with loss estimated at \$200,000.
