

ANOTHER BOOZE SHIP CAPTURED, 30 SHOTS FIRED

NEW YORK, Mar. 17.—Fifteen special revenue agents today arrested 24 men after a pistol battle aboard a two-masted schooner, said to have been loaded with contraband liquor in the East river at foot of Tiffany street, the Bronx.

More than thirty shots were exchanged. The schooner, whose cargo of liquor was said to be worth nearly half a million dollars, was seized, together with two automobiles and a large moving van, which the authorities said were to have been used in transporting the contraband.

BAKERSFIELD HAS FIRST SNOWSTORM

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., Mar. 17.—For the first time in the history of Bakersfield, people here awakened today to see the city covered with a blanket of snow. The fall is estimated at three inches, one inch remaining on the ground this morning. The snow of last night was the heaviest and most prolonged in the city's history. It is not thought that lettuce or other truck crops were damaged seriously.

TAPT, Cal., Mar. 17.—Snow covered the ground here last night and this morning. It was two inches deep, the heaviest fall on record here.

BANK OF ENGLAND RAISES DIVIDENDS

NEW YORK, March 17.—The Bank of England which has distributed a five per cent dividend semi-annually since 1914, has increased the rate to 6 per cent, a telegram to a financial agency said today. A dividend at an annual rate of 12 per cent has not been paid by the Bank of England for the whole year since 1806.

ters, concerts, cabarets, baseball games and other entertainments; \$1,151,000,000 for tobacco and related materials, \$750,000,000 for candy and chewing gum; \$831,000,000 for sodas and confections and \$959,000,000 for personal adornment.

Comparing the expenditures of the United States during 1921-22 on its army with the sums expended by other nations, Mr. Kahn said the United States' expenditures totaled \$345,155,000, or \$3,222 per capita, while those of the British empire, exclusive of dependencies, amounted to \$567,123,000 or \$12.35 per capita; France \$993,927,000 or \$22.12 per capita; Italy \$246,081,200 or \$6.70 per capita, and Japan \$189,082,900 or \$3.38 per capita.

"These figures show that we are exceedingly mindful of the welfare of our people in keeping down military costs and expenditures," declared the speaker.

The army appropriation bill which until a year ago was drafted annually by the committee of which Mr. Kahn is chairman, was framed under the new rules of the house by a sub-committee of five members of the appropriations committee headed by Representative Anthony, republican, Kansas.
