## OGLE KILLED BY GUARD SALEM PEN

**Life Termer Shot Through Heart When He Refuses to Stop Throwing Rocks at John Davison, Guard—Threatened to Kill Davison Unless Released.**

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 21.—James Ogle, serving a life sentence in the state penitentiary here for the murder of George Ferringer and New Burgess, at the Claremont tavern, near Portland during a robbery two years ago was shot to death in the court yard of the isolation ward of the prison by John Davison, a guard, shortly after 7 o'clock this morning.

The attempt of Ogle to make good repeated threats to kill his guard unless he was released from the isolation ward, where he has been confined for nearly a year, was responsible for the shooting according to prison officials. His latest threat was that he would kill his guard unless he was released by March 19.

## SYMPATHY STRIKE UPHELD BY JUDGE

SEATTLE, Mar. 21.—Right of labor unions to call out members who have no grievance with employers to benefit members already on strike was upheld by Superior Judge Everett Smith in dismissing a suit for \$29,000 damages brought by the Pacific Typetting company against International Typographical union local No. 202, and its officers.

The suit grew out of a strike in local job shops last May, following refusal of employers to establish the 44 hour week. Printers employed by the Pacific Typetting company did not strike, as a 42 hour week had already been established in that plant. A result of the strike was to throw a large volume of business to the company from the shutdown shops. To make the strike more effective, the union called out the men employed by the company.

## TAKE UP SOLDIERS BONUS BILL ON THURSDAY, FRIENDS SURE OF VICTORY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21.—The soldiers' bonus bill will be taken up by the house Thursday under suspension of the rules under a plan agreed upon today at a conference between Speaker Gillett and Chairman Campbell of the rules committee.

## Rejected Lovers in Two States Shoot Girls; Kill Selves

DIXON, Ill., Mar. 21.—Miss Mildred Butler, 16, who was shot last evening by her jilted lover, Nick Smith, Jr., 19, will recover, hospital attendants said today. The youth, after shooting the girl, turned the weapon on himself and put a bullet through his heart.

## IRISH LAUNCH FINAL EFFORT TO AVERT WAR

Griffith and Collins Meet to Prevent, if Possible, Breaking Out of Civil War With Ulster—Plan to Meet Sir John Craig.

LONDON, Mar. 21.—(By the Associated Press)—Dangers of the situation in Ireland are emphasized by the morning newspapers several of which take the view that little more will be needed to start actual civil war. Sniping between the entrenched forces on either side of the Ulster border has been going on for several days and yesterday machine guns were reported to have been brought into action. Meanwhile disturbances continue outside the six-county area of Ulster.

Moderate opinion in the south favors joint action by the northern and southern governments to relieve the tension on the border according to the Times' Dublin correspondent and it is hinted elsewhere that the earnest conference between Arthur Griffith and Michael Collins yesterday was partly concerned with the possibility of securing such action. It was thought this might involve a preliminary meeting of Mr. Collins with Sir John Craig of Ulster.

Reports of murder, incendiarism and other outrages in the northern district where the tension between the protestants and catholics is most severe, takes much space in the newspapers.

## France Denies Joffre Signed Jap Treaty

PARIS, Mar. 21.—The French government today took cognizance of reports it understood had been circulated in the United States to the effect that Marshal Joffre, while visiting Japan, had signed a treaty for the exploitation of Siberia by France and Japan. This is unofficially denied by the government, which declares Marshal Joffre had no official mission, whatever.

## SEC'Y STATE GIVES LIE TO CHARGE

**Mr. Hughes Flatly Denies the Charge of Secret Agreement With England—Hopes U. S. Delegates Will Be Saved Further Aspersions On Veracity and Honor.**

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21.—Presentation in the senate today of a letter from Secretary Hughes denying flatly that any secret agreement exists for future British-American co-operation, led today to another effort by opponents of the four power treaty to send it back to committee. The effort brought on a warm debate.

The secretary's letter, characterizing suggestions of such an agreement as "absolutely false," was laid before the senate by Senator Lodge, the republican leader and member of the arms delegation who at the same time put into the record a telegram from Paul D. Cravath, New York attorney denying the accuracy of a statement on the same subject attributed to him by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho.

Harding Also Denies  
 WASHINGTON, Mar. 21.—The American government entered into no understandings or agreements during the arms conference that were not embodied in treaty form and made public, it was stated today at the White House in connection with charges in the senate that an understanding had been reached between the United States and Great Britain relative to action in the Pacific.

Cravath Makes Denial  
 Mr. Cravath's telegram embodied the statement issued by him last night in New York in which he declared the words attributed to him in the statement read by Senator Borah in the senate yesterday were either inaccurately quoted or did not correctly convey his meaning.

Senator Borah re-read the Cravath telegram to the senate and declared "that if that kind of a plea had been made in court, the court, of course, would have assessed a judgment of 'guilty' against the man that made it."

Prince Arrives Ceylon  
 COLOMBA, Ceylon, Mar. 21.—(By Associated Press.) The British battleship Renown with the Prince of Wales aboard arrived here today.

## REPEALING TAX FOR O. A. C. STIRS A HORNETS NEST

POTLAND, Ore., Mar. 21.—Heated debate over the 1 1/2 millage tax for the University of Oregon, the Oregon Agricultural college and the State Normal school marked today's session of the Oregon Tax Reduction league. A majority report recommended repeal of the law, while a minority favored its retention, the division being 11 to 7.

Dean Walker of Lane county attempted to prevent J. B. Zigler, delegate at large, from speaking, charging Zigler had made derogatory remarks regarding conduct of students at state institutions during the war. Zigler made denial of the charge and finally obtained the floor.

Johnson, 32, Michael Kelly, 28, and John O'Keefe, 21, were arraigned and charged with the crime in superior court here today. They were given another day to confer with attorneys before entering pleas.

## COAL WORKERS STRIKE AGAINST PUBLIC, CLAIMED

Managing Director Cushing Declares Under the Present Wage Scale Miner Can Make \$5000 a Year—Operators in to Win.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21.—Coal operators who face the prospect of a strike of their employes April 1, but who still refuse to enter a national conference with the coal miners' union are not controlled by "mere madness" but a determination to cure a deep-seated disorder, George H. Cushing, managing director of the American wholesale association declared today in an address before the Washington city club.

Federal court indictments which have charged operators of union mines with conspiracy with the unions in endeavors to fix coal prices and damage non-union coal mines were held by Mr. Cushing as largely responsible for the unwillingness of the coal operators to confer.

Mr. Cushing declared that wages must come down in the mines and he said this was illustrated "by the amazing fact that under the present system a miner can earn \$5000 a year."

Names Piles Minister  
 WASHINGTON, Mar. 21.—Hoffman Phillip of New York, now minister to Colombia was nominated to be minister to Uruguay and Samuel H. Piles, former United States senator from Washington was named to succeed Mr. Phillip at Bogota, the Colombian capital.

LONDON, Mar. 21.—(By the Associated Press.) Henry Jacobi, 19 years old, pantry boy at the hotel where Lady Alice White was injured fatally last Monday night, was arraigned in police court today charged with murder.

## HANGING IS UPHELD BY SUPREME C'T

**State Supreme Court Denies the Application of Elvie D. Kerby for Habeas Corpus Proceedings—Decision Effects Several Men, Including Dr. Brumfield.**

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 21.—Oregon's capital punishment law was upheld today by the supreme court in denying the application of Elvie D. Kerby, under death sentence in connection with the murder of Sheriff T. H. Taylor of Umatilla county, for a writ of habeas corpus.

The supreme court's decision in the case of Kerby will affect several condemned men who are awaiting execution at the Oregon state prison.

## G. O. P. RETAINS HOLD IN MAINE

AUGUSTA, Maine, Mar. 21.—Republicans retain their hold of the third congressional district. With 56 small precincts missing, reports from the special election yesterday show that John E. Nelson, republican, was elected over Ernest L. McLean, democrat, by a majority of 6,294 votes.

## Put On 72 Motor Cars To Stop Crime Wave

NEW YORK, Mar. 21.—A fleet of 72 motor cars, each carrying half a dozen policemen was launched by the police department today in a further effort to check the crime wave. The fleet will be in service day and night. One of the cars will be attached to each of the 72 police precincts. All suspicious appearing persons will be taken into custody. At night each car is to be equipped with a searchlight.
