RUSSIAN PRINCESS ALLOWED IN U. S.

NEW ORLEANS, Mar. 22—Princess Elizabeth Tschernitschew, who says she is the American widow of a former Russian prince, and who has been detained by immigration authorities since her arrival here a month ago from Bremen, was granted her plea today to enter the United States.

The princess told the authorities on her arrival that she was born in this country of a family named Schlich, but that her parents were dead for some years. She told of witnessing the crucifixion of her husband by revolutionists in Russia and of her flight across Russia and Germany to Bremen. The princess said today she planned to lecture on conditions in Russia.
