## 50 CENTS PER DAY, 10-DAY LIMIT FOR TOURISTS URGED

The most constructive step toward Medford getting a first class automobile camp ground was taken by the city council at their session last evening.

A proposition was made to the Medford chamber of commerce whereby they take over the grounds with the understanding that they finance the project and standardize the local grounds which is now being done at Ashland and Grants Pass.

The common council will permit the expenditure of one thousand dollars which was included in the budget for permanent improvements. To this an additional amount of about three thousand dollars will have to be spent to secure the standardized equipment, which if the proposition is accepted the chamber of commerce will have to finance.

As soon as a standardized camp is established a charge of fifty cents a car per day, with a ten day limit of stay, will be made and this will pay the operating expenses and reimburse the chamber of commerce for the expenditure they make.

Under the plan the chamber of commerce will assume the management of the camp grounds until all obligations contracted by them are paid, after which the grounds will be turned over to the city to operate. The standardized camp will be self sustaining and will not necessitate the expenditure of any further tax money.

The directors of the chamber are meeting this afternoon to consider the proposition made to them. The entire proposition hinges upon the arrangements which can be made with the owners of the lands being used for camp ground purposes.

## HEAVY VOTE CAST IN DIRECTOR ELECTION

One hundred and five votes have been cast in the final election for directors of the Medford Chamber of Commerce, which is a greater number than were voted at the primary.

With two days remaining before the polls close, there is every possibility that a large or larger vote will be registered as last year.

The members who have not already done so are urged to exercise the privilege of the ballot as it is only through this means that the majority voices their sentiment in the management of the organization's affairs.

The polls close at seven-thirty on the evening of Friday, March 24 and ballots being sent in should be placed in the mail tomorrow.

## ELECTRIC SHOP HAS NEW RADIO BATTERY

The newest radio "A" battery recently placed upon the market is said to overcome the bothersome noises caused by electrical leakage and consequently gives a far more satisfactory performance, according to Mr. C. L. Brown of the Electric Shop.

Electrical leakage is overcome in this new battery by the use of a special one-piece case which is molded from new rubber. Cell partitions are used with the sidewalls and bottoms so that the construction is truly "monobloc." There is not a single fitted joint anywhere in this container.

To make doubly sure that no flaws or air bubbles might have escaped detection, each one is tested with an electrical current of 18,000 volts which would pass through and spark across the most minute opening that could possibly be present. Danger of leakage of battery solutions is also eliminated at the same time.

This new radio battery is the product of Willard Battery company of Cleveland, Ohio. This company, a pioneer and for a long time the largest builder of automobile starting and lighting batteries has been doing considerable experimental work in the radio battery field. This new "A" battery is the latest addition to their line and is carried by the Electric Shop in this city.

## PROFESSOR LEWIS RESIGNS TO TAKE POSITION IN EAST

SALEM, Mar. 22.—C. I. Lewis, who has been identified with the horticulture of Oregon for sixteen years, has resigned as assistant general manager of the Oregon Growers Cooperative association effective May 1st, and will take up new duties in Chicago. For thirteen years Mr. Lewis was chief of the division of horticulture at the Oregon Agricultural college, and vice director of the experiment station. During his administration there it was generally recognized that one of the strongest departments of horticulture in the United States was built up at that institution. Mr. Lewis helped the Oregon Growers Cooperative association from the first day they started. During June and July, 1919, he toured the state in the interests of the Oregon Growers. August 1, 1919 he was chosen organization manager and carried on the preliminary work and built the organization up to its present membership of 2900 and 32,000 acres. A year ago he was made assistant general manager of the organization.

Mr. Lewis has national recognition as one of the committee of twenty-one appointed by the American farm bureau to work on fruit marketing problems. He is also a director of the American Pomological society and was one of five men from Oregon to represent the state at the agricultural conference.

During the past year Mr. Lewis has had many offers but has finally accepted a position with the International Press company of Chicago, who now control the American Fruit Grower, the largest fruit paper in America. He will be managing editor of this publication.

## MOVIE STARS READY TO FILM PICTURE

JERUSALEM, Mar. 22.—Twenty stars of the American film world arrived in Jerusalem recently to prepare for the filming of the Old Testament story of King David. About 5000 persons are to be employed in the filming of the play. Five thousand sheep, 1000 camels and 2000 goats are also to be used. This is the first time a production of this magnitude has been filmed in the Holy Land.

## METHODISTS ADOPT FILMS FOR CHURCH

LONG BEACH, Mar. 21.—Motion pictures will become a permanent part of the religious activities of the First Methodist church beginning April 21, it is announced by the pastor, the Rev. Lewis Thurber Guild. The educational committee of the church, which is one of the largest in the city will select the productions to be shown. At the first showing, the mechanical equipment will be dedicated to religious work.

## PORTRAITS OF APOSTLES FOUND IN ROME RUINS

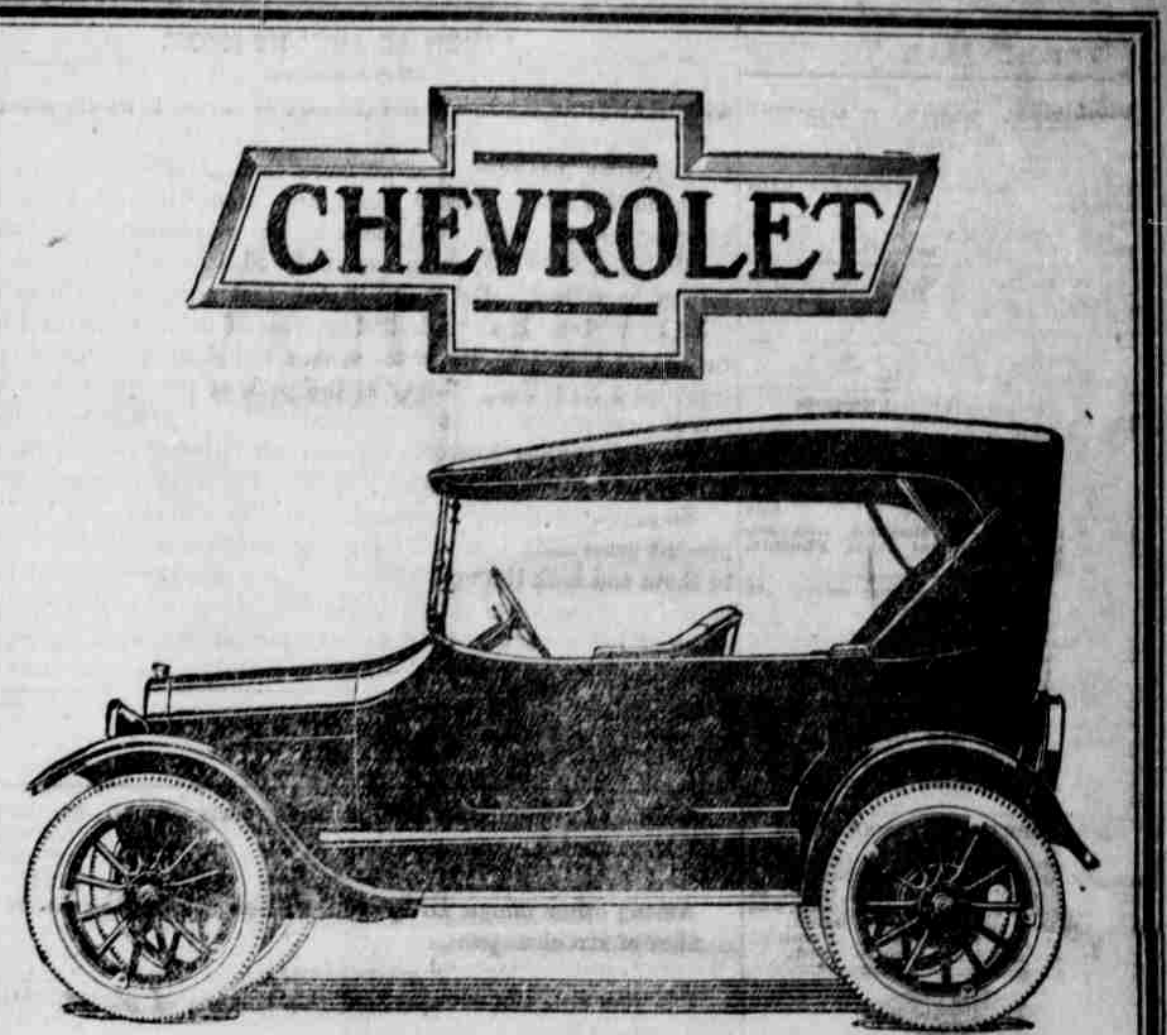
ROME, Mar. 22.—What are believed to be contemporary portraits of St. Peter and St. Paul have been discovered in a hypogeum, or underground structure of the Roman epoch. The belief in their authenticity is shared by the widely known archaeologist, Professor Lanfranco. The hypogeum was found in excavations for the building of a large garage. It comprises a number of rooms and galleries crypt and a christian church with marvelous frescoes of a very early date. The professor believes the portraits were painted from life.
