

FAMOUS DUCK BAR OF OWEN WISTER'S FALLS INTO DECAY

SPOKANE, Wash., Mar. 22.—Famous both as saloon and church in its time, the "Duck Bar" saloon, located in the picturesque Methow valley at the village of Winthrop, now stands deserted, though inside the building still repose the first bar made in Okanogan county and the first back bar mirror imported into the country, in the days when the northwest was a wild land of cattlemen.

The "Duck Bar" was established in the early days by Guy Waring, a Harvard man and one of the big cattlemen of the Okanogan in those days. And to his log cabin in the Methow came Owen Wister, the novelist. In the old saloon Mr. Wister made the acquaintance of all the cowmen of the region, and it was while living at Waring's home that he wrote one of his most famous novels, using the "Duck Bar" as a background. The publication of the book brought the saloon into national notice.

But times changed. The cowmen vanished from the Okanogan, and the saloon was left in idleness. Then came the Episcopal church, anxious to establish a mission at Winthrop, but without a home.

"There's that old Duck Bar saloon of mine," suggested Guy Waring. "You can use that."

The church did. Bishop Herman Page of Spokane established the church there, with the old bar as a lecture and the famous old back bar mirror as a reposed.

Now the church has moved again, into the old Waring log mansion nearby, where Rev. Herman Page, son of Bishop Page, preaches to so many of the people that walked through the pages of Wister's book. And the Duck Bar saloon has passed into that niche of pioneer buildings where history has been made.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—F. E. Scohey, of San Antonio, Texas, was sworn in today as director of the mint for a term of five years, succeeding Raymond T. Baker of Nevada, whose term expired Saturday. He becomes charged with the custody of approximately one-third of the world's gold supply.

R. R. COMMISSION CLAIMS MILEAGE BILL IS ILLEGAL

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—A majority of the members of the interstate commerce commission in a statement presented today to the house commerce committee, held that the bill recently passed by the senate directing the commission to order the sale of interchangeable mileage books at a rate lower than the existing tariff was unconstitutional.

Commissioner Esch declared a majority of the committee believed the bill's provisions would destroy contractual relations between the roads.

"If this became law," Mr. Esch said, "the Baltimore and Ohio railroad would be required to sell books which would be good on the Santa Fe, in a different part of the country, when there is no contract relation between the two roads."

Urging passage of the measure Senator Poindexter, republican, of Washington declared the fixing of the commission's reasonable wholesale rate for interchangeable and interstate mileage books would give the roads immediately a considerable income which just now would be of great benefit to them and at the same time it would give a great impetus to rail travel and business.

RUSSIAN REFUGEES SPREAD DISEASES IN MANY LANDS

BERLIN, Mar. 22.—(By Associated Press.) United States, as well as central Europe, must be on guard against the introduction of cholera and typhus through immigration of Russian refugees, says a warning issued today by Dr. A. Schlessinger of the German Red Cross. Hordes of these refugees are pouring into Germany over the Polish, Latvian and Estonian borders and many are seeking passports to America, where they have relatives and friends who are financing them for the journey.

Already nearly fifty thousand cases exist in Germany, traced to refugees and immigrants from the Volga region, have been infected. Seventy-five per cent of the recent arrivals in the concentration camps are diseased according to Red Cross statistics.
