TREATY RATIFIED BY SENATE

lette, republican, Wisconsin, providing that the Anglo-Japanese alliance shall not be renewed during the life of the four-power treaty was rejected, 30 to 62. Senator Norris again joined the four republican irresconcilables in voting for the reservation. Eight democrats opposed it.

Senator LaFollette then presented and the senate voted down, 27 to 59, a reservation stipulating that the signatories shall not enter into outside agreements prejudicial to the purposes of the treaty. There were five affirmative votes from the republican side and seven negative votes from the democratic side.

By a similar lineup a reservation by Senator LaFollette proposing abrogation of all existing treaties inconsistent with the four-power pact, was voted down, 17 to 64.

Senator Pittman, Nevada, sent to the desk as a proposed reservation, the section of the printed copy of the Lodge League of Nations reservations which reserved to the United States full power to decide what are "domestic questions," falling entirely within its jurisdiction. The reservation was defeated 23 to 65, with four republican irresconcilables supporting it and ten democrats opposing it.

Dividing 29 to 63, the senate voted down a reservation by Senator Johnson, republican, California, which provided that only "specific" means should be employed to fulfill the provisions of the treaty. Five republicans voted aye and ten democrats no.

Senator Johnson then called up the reservation providing that the United States assumes no moral or legal obligation to "maintain" the rights of other powers, originally offered in the foreign relations committee by Senator Brandegee, republican, Connecticut, but withdrawn by him after a conference with President Harding.

The senate rejected it 24 to 64, only Senators Borah, France, Johnson, LaFollette and Norris supporting it on the republican side.

In Senator Walsh's reservation the vote was 18 to 55 representing the largest vote that yet had been cast to qualify the ratification.

Five republicans, Senators Borah, France, Johnson, LaFollette and Norris voted for the reservation, while only three democrats Senators Underwood, Myers and Williams stood against it.

A similar reservation by Senator Robinson, democrat, Arkansas, pledging against aggression against outside powers and giving outside powers the right to sit in any conference affecting their interests, was voted down, 25 to 56.

The same five republicans voted for the resolution and it was opposed only by Senators Underwood, Williams and Ransdell on the democratic side of the chamber.

In still another form the proposal to invite outside powers into conferences involving their interests was re-introduced as a reservation by Senator Pittman, democrat, Nevada, and was defeated 21 to 60. Senators Borah, Johnson, LaFollette and Norris again were the only republicans voting in the affirmative.

Senators Dial, Kendrick, Myers, Ransdell, Underwood and Williams, democrats, were recorded in opposition.

The fourth and final article containing the usual perfunctory provisions for exchange of ratification was agreed to 73 to 8.

That ended the opportunity for offering amendments and the senate began consideration of proposed reservations. Thirteen roll calls had been taken in the hours since the senate met and it was indicated that a score more might be in prospect before the ratification vote was reached.

The first resolution to come before the senate proposed to admit outside powers to conferences affecting their interest. It was offered by Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana and promptly was voted down.
