## EFFORT TO ALTER PACT AGAIN FAILS

**Roinson Amendment Defeated in Senate By Vote of 20-53 — Ten Democrats Vote With Republicans—France Accepts No Alliance Resolution to 4-Power Treaty.**

PARIS, March 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—The French government will approve adoption by the French parliament of the "no alliance" resolution for the four power Pacific treaty adopted by the United States senate. It was stated today in official circles.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—By a vote of 20 to 53 the senate refused today to amend the four power supplemental treaty so as to exclude the Japanese island of Sakhalin from the scope of the four power agreement.

The amendment introduced by Senator Robinson, democrat, Arkansas, received the vote of only four republicans—Senator Borah, Idaho; France, Maryland; Johnson, California, and LaFollette, Wisconsin, while ten democrats, Senators Broussard, Louisiana; Dial, South Carolina; Fletcher, Florida; Trammell, Idaho; Underwood, Alabama; Walsh, Montana; Williams, Mississippi; Owen, Oklahoma; Myers, Montana, and Pomeroy, Ohio, were included among those who opposed it.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—A new way out of the treaty tangle was suggested in the senate today by administration leaders and criticized as inadequate and ineffective by the treaty's opponents.

Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the republican leader, declared on the floor that the best solution of the situation occurring to him was to include in the resolution ratifying the formal supplementary agreement a resolution re-stating the informal "declaration" signed with the treaty.

It was because of the senate's failure to act specifically on this informal supplement on the treaty opponents had challenged the validity of the Friday's ratification of the pact itself.

Declaring while he was ready to vote for a separate resolution of ratification giving senate approval to the supplement, Senator Hitchcock told the republican leaders that such a solution would be only a subterfuge which would lead in the future to endless uncertainty and controversy over the very issues which are the most dangerous to peace in the Pacific.

"I warn you," said the Nebraska senator, the Japanese are likely to treat the supplement as a separate document. Japan will be able to ratify the document we were supposed to have ratified here last Friday, and then she can shake her finger at us so far as immigration is concerned."

**Textile Strike Extends**  
 LAWRENCE, Mass., Mar. 27.—The New England textile strike was extended today to this city, with curtailment of production in several plants but no disorders. Several thousand operatives refused to go to work in protest against a 20 per cent wage cut.

**Coal Bark Sinks**  
 NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Mar. 27.—The Panama bark Maria Borges, loaded with coal, mysteriously sank in the harbor here early today. Several of her crew escaped in small boats. They reported that the craft filled rapidly and went down in a short time after they found she was leaking.

## Marshal Joffre, Hero of Marne Arrives As Evangel of Peace

VICTORIA, B. C., Mar. 27.—Field Marshal Joffre of France, a distinguished soldier, but now, in his own words, here as an evangel of peace, arrived at Victoria from the far east today on the liner Silver State. With him were Mme. Joffre, Samuel Hill of Seattle, whose guests they will be while in the northwest and a number of military aides.

The hero of Marne came as an ordinary passenger on the Silver State, not on an official mission, he explained, but in the course of his tour around the world. His only mission he said, was solely in the interest of a permanent and lasting peace. During his forthcoming tour of the United States and Canada he will speak for peace and one of his first acts will be to dedicate the international peace portal at Blaine, Wash., on the boundary line between the United States and Canada.

## ALLIES ISSUE ULTIMATUM TO BELLIGERENTS

**Adrianople Opened to and Gallipolis Ceded to Greeks—Armenians Placed Under Central League of Nations—3 Weeks Allowed for Reply.**

PARIS, Mar. 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—Turkey is conceded nearly all her claims except those to Adrianople and part of eastern Thrace, in her memorandum which the allied foreign ministers today forwarded to Athens, Ankara and Constantinople with a view to its acceptance as a preliminary peace settlement, revising the treaty of Sevres.

The Enos-Media line in Thrace is modified so as to give Turkey more territory on the Bulgarian frontier, but the old Turkish capital of Adrianople is excluded.

Constantinople remains Turkey's, and she retains Armenia with the population under League of Nations protection, but she loses the Gallipoli peninsula and Mesopotamia.

The foreign ministers give the Greek and Turkish belligerents three weeks in which to reply to the proposals.

PARIS, Mar. 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—The allied foreign ministers have sent Greece and the Turkish governments at Constantinople and Ankara a memorandum of the proposed revisions of the treaty of Sevres, with a view to its acceptance as a preliminary peace settlement in case the Turks agree to the armistice previously proposed.

The features of the proposed preliminaries to peace are: Perpetual freedom of navigation of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus. Turkish sovereignty over all of Asia Minor and all of the territory bordering on the Caucasus, Persia, Mesopotamia and the Mediterranean and Aegean seas.

## ERIN SWEEP BY VIOLENCE SPITE PARLEY

**Religious Conflict Flares Up Again, Ulster and Outrages Continue, While Ulster Cabinet Accepts Invitation to London Conference and Irish Free State Bill Passes.**

BELFAST, Mar. 27.—(By Associated Press.) A notice posted near the city hall in Dundalk, county Louth, a strong Sinn Fein center near the northern border of the free state territory calls attention to the absence of any resolution by the non-Catholic body of county Louth against murderous acts and calls upon the protestants to act immediately, failing which we are determined to use the same means they in Belfast used to our fellow Catholics.

LONDON, Mar. 27.—(By Associated Press.) The Irish free state bill passed its third and final reading in the house of lords today.

BELFAST, Mar. 27.—(By Associated Press.) The Ulster cabinet today accepted the invitation extended by Colonial Secretary Churchill to a conference in London of Irish leaders, called in view of the disturbed conditions in Ireland.

DUBLIN, Mar. 27.—(By Associated Press.) The correspondent of the Freeman's Journal at Charleville, county Cork, has been arrested. Apparently says the newspaper the Irish republican authorities were offended by his report of an attempt to break of a pro-treaty meeting at Charleville.

LONDONDERRY, Mar. 27.—A force of republicans attacked the police barracks at Newtown Cunningham, occupied by free state troops, early Sunday. After a rifle duel of three hours duration, the attacking party retired, leaving six prisoners and several wounded.

Oriel house, near Omeath, close to the county Louth-Armagh border, the residence of J. C. Bentley, which was about to be taken over for the Ulster police, was burned to the ground with its contents Saturday night.

**Convention Ends**  
 DUBLIN, Mar. 27.—(By Associated Press.) The convention of Irish republican members which had been hidden by the Dail cabinet ended its lengthy session late last night without exciting outward demonstration. The provisional free state government made no attempt to interfere with the proceedings and has not definitely stated it will take any action although it is generally supposed that those who attended will be treated as having separated themselves from the rest of the army and their names may possibly be stricken from the army rolls.

DUBLIN, March 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—Before the announcement that Premier Sir James Craig of Ulster had accepted the British government's invitation to go to London had reached Dublin, Michael Collins, head of the provisional government, held a meeting of his cabinet ministers after which the following statement was issued: "At the present moment it has not been announced whether Sir James Craig intended to accept the invitation of the British government. ## Supreme Court Holds C. Ponzi Must Stand Trial, 22 Indictments

WASHINGTON, March 27.—Charles Ponzi, whose financial exploits in Boston resulted in his plea of guilty in November, 1920, in the federal courts to one of two indictments, and his sentence to imprisonment for five years, must stand trial in the Massachusetts courts, this time on 22 indictments charging him with certain crimes under the state laws, it was held today by the supreme court in an opinion delivered by Chief Justice Taft.

## MEXICAN REDS DECLARE WAR ON CATHOLICS

5 Killed, 11 Wounded When Mexican Bolsheviki Attack Catholic Church—Threaten Death to Editor Who Opposes Bolshevism

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 27.—(By Associated Press.) Five persons were killed and eleven wounded seriously in clashes at Guadalajara, Jalisco, yesterday between radicals and Catholics, according to the best available information here.

The radicals are reported to have attacked pedestrians and motorists indiscriminately the climax being reached when they attacked a group of Catholic workmen who had attended a labor meeting.

When the workmen took refuge in a nearby church, the building was fired on by the radicals. The body of one victim was found in the church.

The radicals attacked shortly after noon when the usual Sunday procession of automobiles was proceeding around the main plaza of the city. The traffic was stopped, many occupants being forced to alight and salute red and black flags most of which were carried by female radicals.

The demonstrators then went to the office of the newspaper El Informador where threats were made against the life of the editor if he persisted in his attacks on bolshevism. The radicals then marched past the cathedral. Invektives and insults were hurled at the priests and the clergy in general, after which a noisy demonstration was staged in front of the office of the Catholic newspaper Restauracion.

Later the crowd began the indiscriminate rioting. The police were unable to cope with the situation and federal troops were rushed to the scene to restore order.

## Golfer Gets 2 Birdies; 1 An English Sparrow

FRESNO, Cal., Mar. 27.—Two birdies on one hole was the phenomenal record made at the Sunnyside country club golf links here yesterday by Gerald Thomas.

Teeing off from No. 5, Thomas made a beautiful drive which sailed straight for the pin. One hundred and fifty yards down the fairway a flock of sparrows suddenly swooped into the course of the ball. Thomas' first "birdie" was registered when his ball decapitated one of the sparrows.

After pausing to mourn over the death of the sparrow, Thomas played a full mashie approach to the green. His ball rolled into the cup, giving him birdie No. 2. The hole is a par three.

## MYSTERY SURROUNDS THE STRANGE SHOOTING THREE MEN IN N. Y. CITY

NEW YORK, Mar. 27.—Three men were shot to death under mysterious circumstances in New York last night and early today.

Henry Stern, a young chauffeur, walked in the 115th street crowd. A muffled report was heard, Stern fell to the sidewalk. He was taken to a hospital and died a short time afterward.

## REX BEACH SAYS 'TEX' ON SQUARE

**Famous Writer Testifies in Trial of N. Y. Promoter—Has Known Rickard 24 Years and Always On the Square—Drexel Biddle Also Testifies.**

NEW YORK, Mar. 27.—Tex Rickard took the stand in his own defense today in his trial on a charge of assaulting a 15-year-old school girl.

Rickard began his testimony by telling of his past experiences as a Texas cattle driver and as a participant in the Alaska and Nevada gold rushes. He admitted he had operated gambling houses in several places but asserted that one of his strictest rules in every place he owned was that unescorted women should not be permitted to enter.

He declared that he never employed women in gambling houses and did not believe they were necessary even during the rather wild days in Alaska.

NEW YORK, Mar. 27.—Mrs. May Rickard today took the stand in defense of her husband, Tex, charged with assaulting a 15-year-old east side girl, and testified that the sports promoter was at home from about 7 to 8 p. m. on November 12, the night the assault was alleged to have been made in a West 47th street apartment house. Prosecution witnesses previously had testified that Rickard met the girl, Sarah Schoenfeld, at 7:30 o'clock.

Mrs. Rickard testified that she had been in November 12, when several guests had been invited to dinner. She said that her husband had come home as usual about 6:30 or 7 o'clock and that after dinner he had come to her room. That, she thought was about eight o'clock.

NEW YORK, March 27.—Rex Beach testified today that Tex Rickard was known in Alaska as being "on the square."

The novelist was called as a character witness by lawyers defending the sports promoter at his trial on a charge of assaulting 15-year-old Sarah Schoenfeld of the east side.

Beach said that he had known Rickard for 24 years, and that they had driven spikes together during the Klondike gold rush. Later Rickard ran a gambling house in Alaska in which the novelist said he never had heard of anything crooked happening.

Asked some hypothetical questions on whether he thought gambling honorable, Beach said that at that time gambling in the far north was not against the law, and whether the business was honorable depended on whether it was run on the level.

The next character witness was Charles E. Herron, who described himself as miner, fisherman and publisher of the Anchorage Daily Times. He also stated that Rickard had a good reputation in the north land. As to the ethics of gambling, the witness said he now abhorred it, but that when the gold rush was on everyone did it and no one thought anything about it.

**Drexel Biddle Testifies**  
 The symposium on gambling was continued when Major A. J. Drexel Biddle of Philadelphia, for 14 years leader in the Bible class movement, testified that he knew nothing about Rickard's character.

After he had stated that he had met the promoter in Toledo on the day of the Dempsey-Willard fight, he was asked what he thought of gambling. He replied: "I consider that a man who ran a
