

CARL NEWBURY TO SING WITH OREGON GLEE C. TOMORROW

Carl Newbury, of Medford, is one of the nineteen members of the University of Oregon's Men's Glee club which will appear at the Nat. Wednesday evening, March 29, in the second concert of the spring tour. The program is a splendid variation of classical, popular, and humorous numbers and will be the same as the one presented in Portland which received a big ovation there.

John Stark Evans, director of the club, is one of the best known men on the coast in this line of work. He is assistant dean of music at the university and is professor of piano and organ.

Ronald Reid, accompanist, traveled over the United States doing concert work with the Ellison-White Chautauquian company. At present he is assistant in piano in the University School of Music.

The alumni of the university are planning various entertainments for members of the club in the different towns. In Medford, Cottage Grove, and Oakland the high schools are sponsoring the concerts.

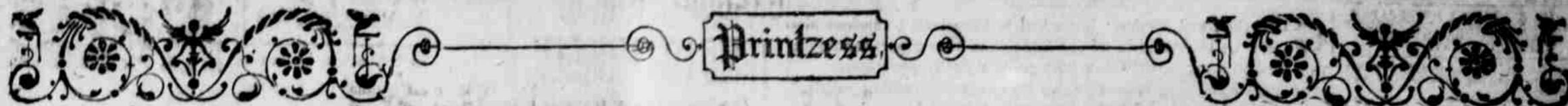
WM. PHILIPS NAMED UNDER SECY. OF STATE
