

### REVIVALIST WINS CROWDS WITHOUT GLAP TRAP TALK

"What is your impression of the evangelist?" was the question put to one of the attendants at the revival service last night.

"The best I have ever heard," was the quick response. And so say many who have heard him, and they say so not because Dr. Peck is a past master at clap-trap sensationalism, but because he "lays the axe to the root of the tree" as did his Master long ago.

His sermons are characterized by irrefutable logic, his style by epigrammatic sentences of unusual poignancy, and his delivery by evident sincerity and earnestness. Appealing to the mind of his hearers, yet he does not fail to grip their hearts.

His sermon last night was on the text, "What is your life?" from James the fourth chapter, the fourteenth verse. He said in part:

"That text immediately raises the question, 'What is life?' There is but one answer. No one but God knows. Life escapes all efforts of man to discover it by human means. It is invisible. It cannot be seen. It is intangible. It cannot be touched. It is imperishable. It cannot be weighed. It is colorless. It cannot be smelt. It is inaudible. It cannot be heard.

It cannot be seen under the microscope, nor can the telescope find it. When the surgeon seeks for it with his knife it escapes him at the point of his instrument.

We know that there is such a thing as life but what its essential essence is we do not know.

Whence then is life? Some tell us that it had its origin in matter, force and motion. But whence are they? How comes it that these forces are acting so harmoniously? We are living in a material universe where law and order prevail. No planet ever runs amuck. Men can calculate to a fraction of a second when the planets in their orbits will arrive at a given point millions of years ahead. Such a thing is not possible to non-thinking forces. And besides this, the whole universe gives marked evidence of force and care for the creatures which inhabit it.

If some one says matter is eternal, that is impossible. For matter is continuously changing in time, and change in time implies succession, and succession in time implies a beginning, and that which has a beginning cannot be eternal; while, having once been originated it might be everlasting. God alone is eternal, in the sense that He alone is the only uncreated being. He describes Himself when He says, "I am the Eternal; I change not." Hence Christ says, "I give unto them eternal life."

If our life be God-derived, then it has God-like possibilities. Man, throughout eternity, has limitless possibilities of growth. If limitless possibilities are ours, then limitless responsibilities are also ours. We are stewards of life, and must give an account thereof. To whom much is given, of him shall much be required. Then eternal loss or gain is ours according as we are in discord or harmony with God.

### One of First White Children Born Puget Sound Passes Away

SEATTLE, Mar. 30.—Mrs. Mary McElroy, 59, one of the first white children born in the Puget Sound country, is dead here after an illness of six weeks.

Mrs. McElroy's father, John R. Williamson, moved to the Pacific coast in 1861 settling at Seabeck on Hood canal. Shortly after the birth of his daughter in November, 1862, he moved to Freepore, now West Seattle, a suburb. There he erected the first mill in the Seattle district and operated the first tugboat line.

Mrs. McElroy's husband, Matt J. McElroy and three sons, all living here survive her.

### M'NARY PROMISES FROST AID ALSO AID IRRIGATION

The U. S. Department of Agriculture as a result of efforts made by Senator Charles L. McNary will detail an irrigation expert to come to the Rogue River valley for a short period of time and instruct local orchardists as to the best methods of procedure in the irrigation of the different types of soils in different situations. It is the plan of the department to have this man instruct some of the prominent orchardists, with leisure time, minutely in these matters and to have these men in turn advise orchardists who have not the time at their disposal to receive the instruction while the expert is here.

### USES POCKET RADIO TO STEAL STOCK NEWS

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 29.—Discovery of a pocket radio system to be worn concealed under an overcoat with the alleged purpose of flashing through the air stolen secret data of the stock market, was announced here today by the police detective bureau. Detectives said they seized the device after raiding with a search warrant the offices of Attorney and company, stockbrokers here, E. L. Lordon, reported to be manager of the firm, already was under charges of embezzlement. He is accused of diverting wrongfully \$500 given him by Miss Della Gilmore of San Jose, Cal. Detectives were said to have found a radio receiving station on the roof of a building near the offices.

### Jap Is Sentenced for Selling Navy Secret

TOKIO, March 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—Tsuruo Hamaguchi, a retired lieutenant of the Japanese navy, was convicted today of attempting to sell a naval secret to Captain Edward Howe Watson, former American naval attaché at Tokio, two years ago. Hamaguchi was sentenced to one year at penal servitude.

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### ARMOUR DENIES UNFAIR DEALING IN STOCKYARDS

KANSAS CITY, March 30.—J. Ogden Armour, head of Armour and company, was the first witness when the department of agriculture's hearing of charges of unfair practices at the Mistletoe stockyards was resumed yesterday.

Mr. Armour was subpoenaed by the plaintiffs who include representatives of the Kansas City Livestock Exchange together with a large number of Kansas and Missouri livestock associations.

Mr. Armour was asked to explain the organization of Armour and company, but an objection to the question was sustained. He testified that the Fowler Packing company, operating the Mistletoe yards is a subsidiary of the Armour interests and that all his stock is owned by Armour and company.

The witness said the yards were taken over at the time Armour and company acquired the Fowler properties and were continued in operation for the convenience of the Fowler plant.

Asked how prices paid consumers at the yards were determined, he replied:

"I understand we fix the price at the yards after the hogs are received."

Mr. Armour said he understood it was a practice to have only one shipper at a given point consign hogs to the Mistletoe yards.

Mr. Armour testified that every packer in Kansas City has to buy hogs from farmers because there are not enough in the public market to supply the packers' requirements. He said receipts at the Mistletoe yards were too small to militate against the open market.

World conditions and not the packers, make or break markets, Mr. Armour told J. H. Moxner, secretary of the Kansas Livestock association and Dr. O. O. Wolf, Ottawa, Kan., head of the National Livestock Producers' association in an informal discussion during the hearings.

### JUDGE GIVES UP BENCH TO LADY

WICKLIFFE, Ky., Mar. 30.—Unique in annals of court procedure, Judge Morris gave up his bench to a woman, the jury was composed exclusively of women, in a case tried in county court here yesterday.  
Mrs. Della Blankenship caused the arrest of Mrs. Ollie Winters on a charge of disturbing the peace. Both sides agreed that a jury of six women try the case and Judge Morris, presiding, stepped from the bench and appointed his clerk, Mrs. Lennie Rollins, to act as judge. The jury returned a verdict of guilty and Judge Rollins fined Mrs. Winters \$10 and costs.

### HOOGH HOUND IS POISON VICTIM

DENVER, Mar. 30.—Count Von Araphanos, imported police dog whose success as a "hoogh hound," recently caused E. J. McGinnish, state prohibition director to make a report on his activities to the prohibition authorities in Washington, is dead.

Yesterday afternoon he ate some poisoned fish and died a short time later. The dog had been used here by federal officials to nose out bootleggers. He is said to have led agents to stills and stocks of liquors when other efforts to locate them failed.

### Taylor Spent Fortune on "Movie" Actresses

LOS ANGELES, March 30.—Fifty thousand dollars a year was spent by William Desmond Taylor, film director, whose mysterious death by shooting here February 1 has baffled the police, according to an announcement today by the public administrator.  
An estate of \$24,000 remains, according to the accountants. Out of this many bills are to be paid, including \$1,112.50 for a jade tassel purchased from a local jewelry store, and \$1,100 funeral expenses. Investigation revealed Taylor spent large sums in presents to motion picture actresses.

### 2 RUSSIAN RADICALS KILLED IN BERLIN

BERLIN, Mar. 30.—(By Associated Press.) Two czarist officers have been arrested, charged with killing Vladimir Naboukoff and attempting to assassinate Professor Paul N. Milukoff. The men are Peter Schabelski-Broek and Jaribos Tabowitzki. M. Naboukoff was killed during an attack on M. Milukoff while the latter was addressing a Russian meeting here last night.

Both suspects have been identified by people who were on the stage when the shots were fired but the authorities believe other Russian monarchists also were implicated in the plot to assassinate M. Milukoff.

M. Milukoff formerly was minister of foreign affairs in the Russian provisional government and M. Naboukoff was secretary of state in the first Russian parliamentary cabinet under Prince Lvoff.

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### NEW ORGANIZATION APPLE GROWERS ON COAST IS FORMED

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 30.—Cold storage facilities on the public docks of Portland, a common terminal on the Atlantic seaboard for receiving apple shipments by rail and water, better service from transportation companies and co-operative buying of orchard supplies in large quantities are the aims of an organization of Northwest apple growers which was effected here yesterday.

Twenty apple growers and members of co-operative associations from Idaho, Washington and Oregon were present.

The new organization met with representatives of the Portland public dock commission this afternoon to arrange for refrigeration.

A. W. Stone, president of the Hood River Apple Growers association, who issued the call for the meeting, was elected president of the new organization and H. L. Geary of Underwood, Wash., secretary.
