As an official of his government he has performed a needed service. The England of today is not the England of ten years ago, but neither is it an England of feminist freaks and garrulous busy-bodies. It has advanced but it hasn't apparently lost its essential roast beef fibre.

The states were states at the time the constitution went into effect, the confederation preceding the constitution, being a confederation not of colonies but of states. The question, however, was for many years an important one involving as it did the entire question of state rights. Secessionists maintained the states were older than the union, and reserved the right of secession, the federal government being merely an agent of the states. This contention was settled against the advocates of states rights by the Civil war.

Indiana Woman is Killed by Koreans

WASHINGTON, March 30.—Inquiry was made of the state department today by Representative Sanders of Indiana as to details of the killing yesterday in Shanghai of Mrs. W. J. Snyder, wife of a Brazil, Ind., coal mining company official by Koreans, who attempted to assassinate General Gilchi Tanaka, former Japanese minister of war.

The department informed the Indiana representative it had not more information than that appearing in press dispatches.
