SETTLE QUESTION OF MEDFORD BALL TEAM ON MONDAY

Seven representative Medford men have been drafted by different organizations at the request of the American Legion to put the baseball question to the final test. Monday afternoon they will meet at the American Legion clubrooms at three o'clock and attempt to cover the business district before closing time, giving those who wish to help finance the baseball team a chance to contribute.

It is not anticipated that any considerable sum will be realized in profit for the season, but should there be a profit, a sum will be set aside for next year and the balance divided among the players, no one else making any profit whatever out of the sport.
