TRAIL-PROSPECT**

Sealed proposals for constructing the Trail-Prospect national forest road project located adjacent to Crater National forest, state of Oregon, county of Jackson, will be received by the district engineer, bureau of public roads, U. S. department of agriculture, at Portland, Oregon, until 10 o'clock a. m. on the 20th day of April, 1922, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids, and none will be considered except those from contractors ascertained to be experienced and responsible.

The length of the project to be constructed is approximately 13.6 miles. The work embraced in this contract shall be completed within 120 weather working days, following the execution of the contract by the secretary of agriculture.

The contract form and maps, plans, specifications, and estimates of quantities may be examined by responsible contractors at room 316 Postoffice building, Portland Oregon, and at the office of the forest supervisor, at Medford, Oregon.

IS BOUND OVER
FOR NON-SUPPORT**

R. E. Johnson was bound over to the grand jury this morning on \$300 bond on a charge of non-support. He was arrested yesterday by Constable Hemstreet in Grants Pass and was brought to this city for a preliminary hearing before Justice Glenn O. Taylor.

The charge was preferred by Johnson's wife who lives in this city and who is the mother of two children, a boy and a girl, nine and ten years of age. It is alleged that Johnson has contributed nothing to the support of his wife and children since he has been in Grants Pass.

He was acquitted last fall in circuit court on a charge of embezzlement preferred by Harry Peltz, a wholesale tobacco dealer of Klamath Falls. Johnson was handling the Medford, Ashland and Grants Pass business of the firm for Peltz.

**PASTEURIZATION
PORTLAND MILK
INSISTED UPON**

A Portland paper of yesterday reported the ninth death from septic sore throat and 100 cases in the city and says:

"State health authorities asserted today that the disease is milk borne and urge emergency legislation by the city council which would require pasteurization of milk from all dairies before it is put on sale.

"In a letter to Dr. John C. Abele, acting city health officer, Dr. F. H. Stricker, state health officer, said:

"Streptococcus sore throat is now a recognized disease entity with a distinct clinical history. The cause of this disease is known to be the streptococcus hemolyticus. Most authorities agree that the disease is milk borne. The public should be informed in regard to this fact in order that they may take steps to protect themselves during the prevalence of an epidemic.

"Epidemic sore throat is caused by the ingestion of milk or milk products that contain the streptococcus hemolyticus.

"The source of contamination is due to the contact of milk with infected milkers and milk handlers. The udder of the cow is infected by the milk and an inflammation of the udder or mastitis takes place.

"In an epidemic of streptococcus sore throat very little good is accomplished by isolation and quarantine of patients. The one effective measure is to radiate the source of infection. As far as is known at the present time milk is the source of infection. Pasteurization will destroy the germ.

"After carefully considering these facts the state board of health recommends that an ordinance be drafted requiring all dealers to pasteurize milk before offering the same for sale. As an emergency measure, the public should be advised to boil all milk that is not pasteurized before using the same.

"Compulsory pasteurization is the solution of this problem and many of the largest cities of this country are demanding that milk before it is offered for sale must be brought to a temperature of 145 degrees F. and held there for 30 minutes."

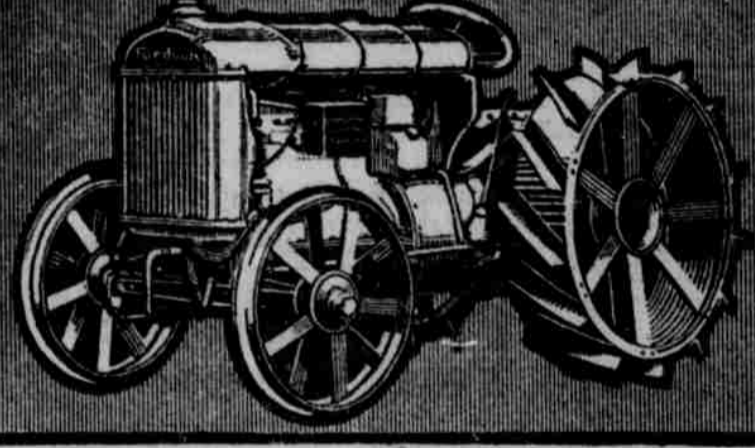
