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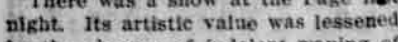
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Ye Smudge Pot

INDIANAPOLIS, April 4.—Isiah
Moore, who has thirteen marriages to
his credit, was sentenced to serve
from two to fourteen years in the
state reformatory today on a charge
of embezzlement and was fined \$1899
and costs, and disfranchised for five
years.

Moore who is said by police to have
confessed to having at least thirteen
wives in various parts of the United
States, also was sentenced to serve
from two to five years in the state
prison on a charge of bigamy.

VICTORIA, B. C., April 4.—Yester-

Medford has reason to be proud of
the performance of Ethel Barrymore
and company in Declasse at the Page
last night. For it far exceeded in
excellence the performance given in
Washington D. C. last December. It
was precisely the same company with
the exception of the Three Wonderful
Waltons, and a pokenese spaniel
which Zellito trundled before the
starred shirt fronts of the national
capital, but everyone did better,—
or so it seemed to the writer,—and
the stage atmosphere was in many de-
tails superior.

Of course it may be that seeing a
play the second time, gives one a bet-
ter opportunity to observe the fine
points and the good ones. Then too,
Miss Barrymore was suffering from a
very severe cold in December and her
increase in avoirdupois was a shock.
Not so last night. The won-
derful Barrymore voice was in fine
fettle, there was languor and stac-
cato but neither seemed exaggerated,
and the suggestion that Ethel Barry-
more is merely a charming person
with Barrymore mannerisms, who
can't act, was completely annihilated.
As to the much discussed absence of
correcting eating,—once dismiss the
mental picture of the fair Ethel 15
years ago,—and her beauty while
matronly is not less impressive. She
was decidedly handsome and winning
last night.

Edward Emery, the well known
English actor, was at his best in both
performances. Here is an artist of
the first water. Restrained, polished
and yet forceful and convincing, his
art is of that rare type, which com-
bines all art, and becomes the perfect
achievement of creative genius. In
the famous lounge scene, where his
offer of "romance" is made,—by all
odds the best thing in the play,—both
he and Miss Barrymore rose to true
heights of dramatic excellence.

The support of course was good,
and it was grateful to see no playing
down or carelessness in spite of a tour
among the untalented provinces. The
play is rather a sketchy one, techni-
cally as full of holes as a Swiss
cheese, so one hesitates to think what
it would be in the hands of a second
rate group of actors. But Miss Bar-
rymore and her company are far from
that. All in all the best company that
has appeared in Medford for many a
moon.
