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**PIONEER WOMAN JACKSON COUNTY DIES IN KLAMATH**

KLAMATH FALLS, April 5.—Mrs. William R. Jones, for the past seven years a resident of this city, died here Monday morning. She was aged 79 years and six months. The immediate cause of her death was pneumonia, although she had been in failing health for the past several years and for the past five years had been in charge of a nurse.

Mrs. Jones was born in Loudon county, Virginia, September 16, 1842. Her maiden name was Elizabeth A. Gregg. In 1865 she was married to William R. Jones, in Virginia. A year later a son, Wilbur A. Jones was born to the union. In 1872 Mr. and Mrs. Jones and son came from Virginia to Oregon, settling on a farm near Medford, where they lived for about thirty years, and where William R. Jones died in 1911.

In 1915 Mrs. Jones came with her son to Klamath Falls, where she has since made her home, her son providing generously for her care during her years of invalidism.

The family is well known here, Wilbur A. Jones having until a year ago been superintendent of the Ankeny ranch on the Merrill road for seven years.

Besides her son Mrs. Jones is survived by a grandson, William A. Jones Jr., of Klamath Falls and several brothers and sisters, residing in Virginia.

The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Whitlock chapel. The Rev. A. L. Rice made a brief address. The burial took place in the local cemetery.

Wilbur Jones was formerly sheriff of Jackson county and lived here with his mother until six or seven years ago. They owned a large ranch on Ross Lane and were well known throughout Jackson county.

**PROBE RICKARD CHARGE AGAINST CHILD'S SOCIETY**

NEW YORK, April 5.—George L. (Tex) Rickard, sports promoter, who several days ago was acquitted of a charge of having assaulted a fifteen year old girl, today was summoned to the district attorney's office to give further information in connection with his declaration that agents of the child's society had attempted to blackmail him.

William Fields, said to have been employed by Rickard at an apartment here, was sought in West 47th street also was brought for examination by the district attorney.

Several persons were questioned yesterday in an effort to obtain corroborative evidence in support of Rickard's charges. Chief Assistant District Attorney Pecora said he had not carried the investigation far enough to determine whether the case should be presented to the grand jury.

**MULTNOMAH CLUB DECLINES TO JOIN STATE ASSOCIATION**

PORTLAND, April 5.—In a rather spirited meeting, in which the Multnomah Anglers' club went on record against affiliating with the Oregon Sportsmen's association, a body composed of sportsmen's organizations throughout the state, the annual business meeting, combined with the regular monthly meeting, was held Friday night in the Oregon building. The resolution brought heated arguments from both sides, but finally was carried by a large majority.

According to some of the members, when the Oregon Sportsmen's association was organized in Portland recently, a secret caucus was held in the morning of the election and the slate for officers and directors was chosen. R. W. Price, a member of the Multnomah Anglers' club, was chosen one of the directors, although the Multnomah Anglers' club, which chose Jack Herman to represent it, was opposed to him.

**Action Prompts Resolution**

According to the members who presented the resolution, the action of the association in ignoring the choice of Multnomah county's representative and the selection of a map to which the anglers' club was opposed, was the cause for introducing the resolution. Part of the resolution is as follows:

Resolved, That Multnomah Anglers' club do not now enter into nor affiliate with said Oregon Sportsmen's association for the reason that, although Multnomah county does not insist upon representation in the personnel of officers and directors of said state organization, it is unwilling that a Multnomah county resident be made a member of such personnel who is unacceptable to the sportsmen of Multnomah county as their representative; and for the further reason that, in view of the fact that said representative was elected in spite of expressed opposition of Multnomah county's delegate, such action is regarded as indicative of political or other ulterior purposes inconsistent with best interests of the sportsmen of this state, and it is further

Resolved, That the state game commission be requested to withhold state game fund aid from the Oregon Sportsmen's association or any other state organization of its kind, until such organization shall embrace within its membership county associations from counties containing an aggregate of 75 per cent or more of the owners of fishing and hunting licenses issued in this state.

**Officers Are Elected**

The only other matter of importance was the election of officers for the coming year. Paul Ferrans was elected president, Jack Herman, vice-president; Grant Hemphill, secretary-treasurer, and H. W. Metzger, R. J. Kirkwood, A. M. Frank, W. C. Bristol and Dr. C. C. Moore were elected on the board of directors.

A resolution also was adopted commending the work of Walter F. Backus, retiring president, and Jack Herman, retiring secretary. The two great achievements of the club in the last year was the staying of the national casting tournament last August, and the first sportsmen's show ever held in Oregon, last January.

**C. OF COMMERCE REPORT SHOWS A FINE 1921 RECORD**

The first meeting of the holdover and newly elected members of the board of directors of the Medford chamber of commerce was held yesterday afternoon at which routine matters were given consideration.

In the preliminary report of the treasurer it was shown that during the past year the chamber was able to pay all of the operating expenses and a deficit of \$1689.91 which confronted them a year ago and at the same time show a balance of cash on hand to the extent of \$91.85.

There also remains on the first day of April accounts amounting to \$2500 due the chamber by its members and could the directors have had this in cash it would have been possible for them to have expended same to the advantage of the community.

The directors reluctantly accepted the resignation of George T. Collins as a director but did so only upon being assured that his reason for so doing was a physical one. No director was elected to fill this vacancy, nor were the officers chosen for the next fiscal year, it being the desire of the board that an event in the near future be devoted for that purpose.

The reports of the primary and final election tellers were accepted.

**MANY WOMEN TO SIT IN NEXT CONGRESS**

DETROIT, April 5.—Several women will sit in the next congress in the opinion of Mrs. Harriet Taylor-Upton, vice chairman of the republican national committee who was a speaker before the women's republican club here yesterday. The record of Miss Alice Robertson of Oklahoma, Mrs. Upton declared, would aid the candidates of a number of women who are seeking seats in the coming elections.

**Plan Vets Memorial**

ONTARIO, Calif.—A combined world war veterans memorial building and civic auditorium is being planned here. An election to authorize issuance of \$100,000 in bonds to cover the cost of the building will be held April 10.
