REPORT OREGON ELECTRIC LINE TO COME TO MEDFORD

A vague but interesting rumor that the Oregon Electric railway may extend its interurban lines in the Willamette valley to southern Oregon is contained in the following from the Eugene Register of the 5th inst. This is the first time any Willamette valley paper has ever extended the road to this section:

Another rumor in circulation is that the railway company has a crew of surveyors at work in the southern part of Lane county and in the northern part of Douglas, following in general the route selected for the transmission line of the California-Oregon Power company, which is soon to enter the Willamette valley power field by connecting its big hydro-electric plant at Prospect on the Rogue river with the Mountain States Power company's plant at Springfield. The engineers of the power company have encountered members of a crew at work in the sections who, it is said, leaked the information that they were in the employ of the Oregon Electric Railway company. If this is true, it is taken as an indication that the railway company is seeking a route for an extension of its line to southern Oregon.

H. R. Knight, local agent of the Oregon Electric, said yesterday that he knew nothing of any surveys or crews of engineers in the employ of the company in this part of the state.

CLAIM MISSING KELSO BANKER IS STILL ALIVE

TACOMA, April 7.—Depositions designed to show that Fred L. Stewart, missing Kelso banker, is still alive, were read in United States district court here today in the suit of Mrs. Maude E. Stewart, who is seeking to recover \$45,000 on life insurance policies from the Mutual and Prudential Life Insurance companies.

The depositions were in support of the testimony of George Elwood, late of Tacoma, who testified he had seen Stewart in Hanford, Cal., a week after his disappearance from a ferryboat crossing the Columbia river on March 17, 1921. The depositions included one from a Hanford barber, saying he cut the hair of a man he believes to be Stewart, and others from three officers of the steamer Mazatlan, who asserted a man resembling Stewart had taken passage on that boat from San Diego to Manzanillo, Mex.

Elwood was the only witness for the insurance companies, however, who declared his identification of Stewart was positive. He is a traveling salesman and under cross-examination he maintained there could be no doubt the man he saw was Stewart. He said he recognized him in Hanford by his features and by his peculiar manner of walking. He added that he attempted to speak to the man, but he jumped into an automobile and speeded away.

EXTRA JUDGE BILL IS BEATEN IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, April 7.—The amendment of Senator Poindexter, republican, Washington, to write into the bill for more federal judges a provision for an additional judge for the western Washington district, was rejected by the senate today 24 to 35. A proposal by Senator Bursum, republican, New Mexico, for an additional judge in New Mexico, was defeated on a tie vote 32 to 32.

FIND GRAVE OF LINCOLN'S FATHER LOUISVILLE, KY.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 7.—The grave of Abraham Lincoln, grandfather of the martyred President, has been found in a churchyard near here, in the belief of several Louisvillians who recently have completed an extensive investigation.

The investigators found two stones—their inscriptions blotted away by long exposure to the elements,—which they believe mark the grave of the emancipator's grandfather who was killed by Indians in 1786 within sight of his cabin and before the eyes of his three sons.

According to R. C. Ballard Thurston, who made a preliminary investigation of deeds in the Jefferson county courthouse, the examination warrants the belief the land composing the churchyard is part of the Lincoln property, which included 400 acres.

Additional details of the death of the emancipator's grandfather have been revealed by the investigation, it was stated.

When their father fell mortally wounded Mordcaid ran to the house

and procured a rifle while Joshua darted for a nearby fort to obtain aid. Thomas, then a boy of 9 years, remained with his father.

According to the findings, an Indian seized Thomas and was about to scalp him when Mordcaid returned and shot the savage to death. Thomas was released and later became the father of the martyred president.

Murderer Is Acquitted.

DES MOINES, April 7.—Henry Woodruff, on trial for killing Lawrence Tracy, was acquitted of murder this morning by a district court jury. Woodruff shot and killed Tracy at the latter's home on February 14, following an attack upon Woodruff's 14-year-old daughter.

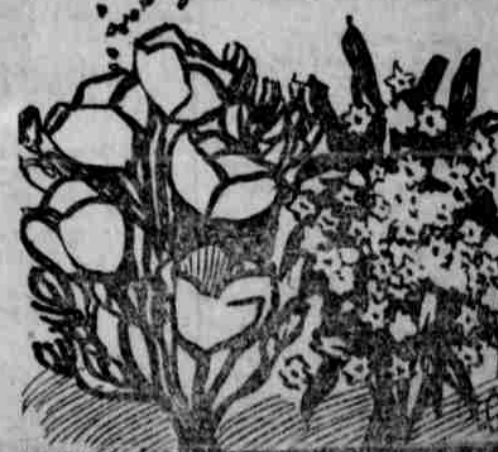
