

# EXALTED RULER KELLY ASSUMES LODGE OFFICE

The new administration of the Elks lodge for the next year is firmly in the saddle today, the installation of the officers having taken place last night as follows: Exalted ruler, Edward E. Kelly; leading knight, Larry Mann; lecturing knight, William Young; secretary, Leo Jacobs; treasurer, Vernon Sawyer; trustee, Horace G. Nicholson; delegate, E. C. Jerome; alternate delegate, O. O. Alenderfer.

The installation was a very happy affair with speeches from the new officials, and the outlook is for one of the best years in the lodge's history. The new exalted ruler fairly radiated sunshine and good feeling on taking over the honor and responsibility of guiding the lodge of 855 members for the next year, and this feeling was contagious.

As always the custom at an Elks lodge installation of a new exalted ruler, although many brothers may have been battling each other on the stools in lodge politics and policies shortly before, the entire membership united in harmony and marches twice around in front of the new local dignitary, saluting him, pledging allegiance to his administration and their best efforts for the welfare of the order and lodge. Judge Kelly beamed benignly and with tear dimmed eyes as his subjects paraded in loyalty before him.

The newly exalted ruler re-appointed Rev. Wm. L. Hamilton as lodge chaplain, and appointed Raymond Beter as esquire, and both assumed office last night with the elective officers. Exalted Ruler Kelly's appointment of committees will not be announced until next Thursday night's meeting.

A feature of last night's installation was the presentation to Exalted Ruler Kelly of a handsome gavel and block on which to pound it, of Oregon myrtle wood from the Coos Bay district, by the past exalted rulers of the lodge with best wishes for a successful administration as follows: L. B. Haskins, W. H. McGowan, C. E. Gates, T. E. Daniels, Gus Newbury, George T. Collins, O. O. Alenderfer, J. J. Buchter and E. C. Jerome.

For the installation W. H. McGowan acted as deputy grand exalted ruler, with the other chairs filled by other past exalted rulers as other acting grand officers.

# BOSTON NEWSBOY HERO OF WAR IS 'HOME' AT LAST

BOSTON, April 7.—"Scotty," 16-year-old Brookline newsboy, who ran away to war and made the 191st infantry proud of him by killing single handed thirty Germans, has returned to Boston in a coffin, draped with the American flag.

The official report read: "Private Albert E. Scott, killed in action."

"Scotty's" mother fainted at the station, where she had gone to meet her returned soldier.

The boy's body will lie in state in Brookline town hall tomorrow. A detachment of his own organization, the 191st, will act as a guard of honor Sunday, when "Scotty" traverses Brookline for the last time.

# WINTER WHEAT IS LESS, RYE MORE

WASHINGTON, April 7.—A winter wheat crop of about fourteen million bushels smaller and a rye crop almost twelve million bushels larger than was produced last year were forecast today by the department of agriculture. Winter wheat came through the winter in good shape and showed an improvement of 2.4 points in condition on April 1, as compared with last December.

The smaller crop is due to a reduction of 12.2 per cent in the area sown last fall as compared with that of last year's crop.

# ELECT RADICAL AS ARGENTINE PREST.

BUENOS AIRES, April 7.—Returns from last Sunday's presidential election from the first two electoral sections and part of the third in the federal capital today gave Marcello DeAlvear, radical candidate, 8,471 votes and Nicolas Repetto, socialist 7,400.

Early returns from the provinces indicate a heavy plurality for Alvear, who until his nomination on the radical ticket was Argentine minister to Paris.
