In fact the only candidates who have not been kicked into the race by the dear people of Oregon, assisted by their legions of friends and backers, appear to be Governor Oleott and Congressman Hawley.

As far as publicity agents are concerned, no one seems to want either of these officials to run. Governor Oleott in fact had the nerve to simply announce that he wanted to be reelected, and Congressman Hawley, following his well established custom of the past 15 years, discerned no riot in his behalf, but briefly announced that he wanted to keep his job and would continue to serve "no interest but the public interest."

Under the circumstances would it not be well to demand a recount of the Oregon Census? With these thousands of militant citizens arising for each of these dozen or more candidates, isn't it morally certain, that two or three hundred thousand voters were overlooked in 1920? It seems so to us.

Roosevelt and the K. K. K.

To the Editor: The national lecturer of the Ku Klux Klan, who lectured to a packed house at the Page Saturday night, exposed in a naive manner the many eternal weaknesses of our poor humans.

The bride of the Pharisee, who thanked God he was not as other men, was there. The ancient Jewish superstitious belief that he belongs to the chosen people of God was there. The hatred of all other races but our own was there. Also the presumed right in God's name to shoot down and murder people for the sake of religion. The brutal desire to intimidate to gain our own ends was there, and the illusion that we, not God, shall judge who shall be cursed.

"We are the chosen people of God," said the preacher. This is what the Jews claimed 4000 years ago. But it seems God has changed his mind about that now. So much so that the modern chosen people will not admit the old chosen people into their fold.

Celt Saturday night I always had the notion that the Americans whipped the Spaniards because they blew up the "Maine." That war cry, "Remember the Maine," must have been all a dream. For did not the Ku Klux Klan lecturer say that Dewey bombarded Manila to the cry of "Come to Jesus." McKinley evidently commissioned Dewey to go and shoot up a lot of Spaniards to make them come to Jesus. It did not make any difference that those Spaniards worshipped that same Jesus. But the main difference seems to be that we, belonging to the Anglo-Saxon or Nordic race, have for the most part a fairer skin than all the other races of this little old world. That being the case, we are the modern chosen people of God and are at liberty, in God's name, to beat up any other race. For did not the Ku Klux Klan lecturer state most emphatically that their cursed blood shall not mix in marriage with ours.

I had the simple old-fashioned belief that no human being is cursed, unless he, by his own actions, made himself so. But no, the Ku Klux Klan can curse any race, person or thing. The lecturer seemed to be very anxious to instill an ignoble feeling of fear into the hearts of his audience. The Ku Klux Klan is everywhere, see everything, knows everything. Beware! Beware!

The Ku Klux Klan and incidentally the Nordic race seem to be the only people that rule by the laws of God and Moses. But Moses was a Jew, and the Catholics have the laws of God and Moses in their Bible by a little oversight.

The lecturer got a bit mixed up on the Roman law. All the cursed human beings outside the Ku Klux Klan and the Anglo-Saxon race are governed by the Roman law, he said. But the Roman law was written ages before the Catholic religion came into existence. Moreover, the old Roman laws are, to some extent, the basis of all our modern laws. But, never mind, it's something to do with Rome anyway (the capital of a cursed people) and the Pope lives there, you know.

I wonder if President Harding knows that the Pope rules millions of Americans. It's the common belief among the cursed races (those not Nordic) that the Pope is a spiritual and religious adviser, same as our good clergy. When Theodore Roosevelt was giving his moral support for the nomination of William Taft for the Presidency, many objected that Taft was a Unitarian, that is, a disbeliever in the Divinity of Jesus Christ and the infallibility of the Bible. Roosevelt then said: "What a man's religious beliefs may be, are matters between him and his Maker. What the people should demand is character."

According to the Ku Klux Klan lecturer Saturday night, God has a new dividing line. On the one side is the Anglo-Saxon race with the fair skin and heaven blue eyes, I suppose. On the other, the darker people with the cursed blood.

I wonder if, after all, it would not be best to stay with the old idea of Universal Brotherhood, and friendship, forbearance and forgiveness for all.
