

MEDFORD DELEGATES TO Y. W. C. A. MEET THIS YEAR NAMED

The Medford Young Women's Christian association will be represented at the seventh biennial convention of that body at Hot Springs, Arkansas, April 20-27, by Mrs. Loraine Cornish president of the local association, and Mrs. E. H. Hurl.

There is great interest in the convention because of the international trend of the program. Noted speakers are to be brought to America to interpret their respective countries. Prominent among the foreign speakers who will address the convention are A. Maud Royden, England's most noted authority on women, and the world's best known woman preacher; Mademoiselle Elaine Goulet d'Alviella of Belgium, a poet, writer and speaker of rare charm; Anne Lamb, of California, an Anglo-Indian now in America after a trip around the world, and Miss Charlotte Niven of London, general secretary of the world's committee.

There is a probability of a notable delegation from South America—and in the student assembly, which is one of the sectional groups of the convention, there will be native Chinese and Japanese delegates. Judge Florence Allen, of Cleveland, the first woman judge in the United States to adorn the bench in a court of general jurisdiction in civil and criminal cases will be one of the distinguished Americans on the program. Mrs. Robert E. Speer, president of the national board, will give a summary of the work done in the past two years. "Facing the Present," is the subject of Miss Mabel Cratty's address. Miss Cratty is general secretary of the national board. Mrs. Frederic MacKey Paist of Philadelphia, president of the convention, will preside until her successor is elected. Over 1500 delegates are expected.
