### TEMPER MARRAIGE VOWS TO CONFORM MODERN NOTIONS

NEW YORK, April 11.—Women in nearly all respects are the equals of men and therefore promises and vows of men and women at marriage should be reciprocal.

Such is the substance of a statement made by George Seabris, member of the commission on revision of the book of common prayer of the Episcopal church, in explanation of some of the changes the commission will recommend to the general convention of the church in Portland, Ore., next September.

He added that the duty of obedience now has been abrogated and that women enjoyed, both in law and thru social convention privileges and immunities which were even denied to men.

And so the commission, he said, had decided it was necessary that the obsolete part of the marriage ceremony, the vow of the woman to obey, be made to conform to the facts of life.

### HUSBAND KILLER SAYS SHE'S CRAZY

BREMERTON, Wash., April 11.—"Not guilty, by reason of insanity," was the plea entered at Port Orchard today for Mrs. Ruth Plumley, who was arraigned on a charge of first degree murder for the slaying of her husband, Hugh C. Plumley, here March 29.

Mr. Plumley's trial was set for April 27.

After her arrest April 4, Mrs. Plumley confessed, officers announced, that she had given poison to her husband in a salad because of her infatuation for another man who had rejected her advances.

Plumley was a former sergeant of marines and an overseas veteran.

### GRAND OPERA COSTS 'FRISCO \$65,000

SAN FRANCISCO, April 11.—Guarantors for the Chicago Grand Opera company will have to stand an assessment of "not more than \$65,000 at the outside," for the deficit incurred by the company in the two weeks just concluded here, it was stated today by Selby C. ### JOFFRE TO UNVEIL BUST OF GRANT APRIL 27TH

NEW YORK, April 11.—Marshal Joffre has accepted an invitation to unveil a bust of General U. S. Grant in the hall of fame at New York University April 27, the centennial of the general's birth.

The bust is by Henry Shrady, whose equestrian statue of General Grant is to be unveiled in Washington the same day.

General Grant was one of 29 selected to the hall of fame at its first election in 1900. A tablet in his honor was placed in 1901.

Mr. Hayes, who during his spare time looks after a beautiful suburban place near Burbank, claims to have discovered a method which has increased the egg production of his poultry yard 40 percent.

Hayes acted upon the psychology that one hen seeing another in the act of laying an egg would do her best to emulate the act of her earnest and prolific sister. He therefore secured a dead hen, had it mounted in a layup position by a taxidermist and placed it in one of the nests in his hen houses. The results, Hayes said, were marvelous.
