FATE AND THE GENOA CONFERENCE.

WE HOPE FATE runs true to form at Genoa. For Fate has a way of doing the unexpected. That is why it has been associated with irony all these years.

Everyone in any way informed, expects the Genoa conference to be a fiasco. Nothing truly constructive can be achieved, no near-cure for European ills can be realized until the international fuds cease and until a virtual United States of Europe based upon mutual confidence and peaceful association, is formed. That is the prevailing idea.

But most of the vital questions involved are not on the Agenda. There is the French-German feud, the British-French feud, the Russian-Baltic feud, and the Russia-French feud, the Italian-Czecho feud, the Greek-Turk feud and, of course, the Irish question, the East Indian trouble and the Jap Siberian imbroglio. Enough trouble one would think to keep Europe in a ferment for another generation. Last but not least the United States, which is the greatest force for peace in the world today, is not officially represented.

The outlook therefore on paper is dubious. But as indicated above, Fate has a way of springing surprises. And whenever nations, stirred by ancient animosities, get together for a talk about their troubles, there is always a chance that the troubles can in some way, be accommodated.

There is that chance, remote though it may be, in the present conference. And there is Lloyd George who will make the fight of his life for some real accomplishment, for on the success or failure of the conference, the British premier's future political fortunes depend.

So it would not be surprising if the outcome of the Genoa conference would be far more reassuring to the future of Europe than any of the wisecracks expect. At least it can't be much worse. And as remarked before, when nations gather together to talk over their troubles rather than to fight over them, the spirit of peace is always a factor, even though it may at the outset be lurking in the background.

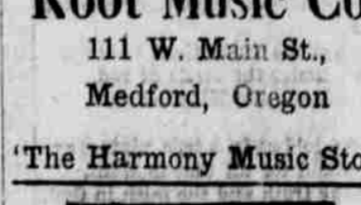
