PIONEER MINER OF VALLEY DIES AT JACKSONVILLE HOME

Antone Rose, a resident of Jackson county for the past 45 years passed away at his home in Jacksonville last evening at the age of 72 years, nine months, 11 days.

Deceased was born in Portugal and spent a great part of his life at sea, being engaged in the whaling industry. The latter part of his life, however, was given to mining, he having come to Rogue River valley with Frank Enis, now deceased, and the two men mined what is known as the Sterling mine. He for a time lived on a farm on Williams creek. He was married to Mayette Gibson who was deceased two years ago. Mr. Rose was at one time a man of considerable means, and became a staunch friend of all who knew him.

The funeral services in charge of Weeks-Conger Co., will be held at his late residence, Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. Interment in Jacksonville cemetery.

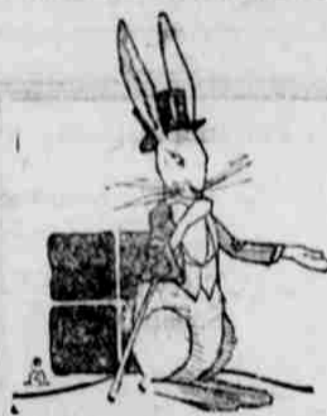

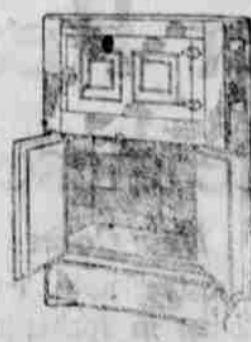
