### J. KRUTSCHNITT ALSO TAKES ISSUE WITH W. G. M'ADOO

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Another prominent railroad official, Julius Kruttschnitt, chairman of the Southern Pacific board, appeared today before the senate inter-state commerce committee and vigorously denied statements by William G. McAdoo, former director general, that the railroads had "broken down" under private operation and were returned to their ownership by the government in an act of grace.

Mr. Kruttschnitt quoted statements by Mr. McAdoo, President Wilson and other officials that federal control was adopted, not because of private breakdowns but to obtain coordination of transportation during the war.

### NEWSPAPER ADS BOOST NEBRASKA TO FIRST PLACE

OMAHA, Neb., April 12.—Nebraska today is leading the other six states of the federal reserve bank district in the service of the government's 4 1/2 per cent treasury certificates and it is all due, in the opinion of L. H. Eubank, cashier of the local federal reserve branch, to advertising.

As a governmental experiment in the value of printer's ink, Omaha was selected as one of four cities in which space was purchased in local newspapers boosting the sale of certificates. Page "ads" appeared in Omaha papers last week and in addition the city was circularized by carriers on their regular routes.

### Can Enter On Land Without Permission

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 12.—Hunters for the state department of agriculture have the legal right to enter privately owned land without permission in the area quarantined for rabies and hunt or poison coyotes and other predatory animals to assist in stamping out this disease, Attorney General J. L. Thompson announced in an opinion today to E. L. French, director of agriculture. Notices should be posted on such lands as provided by law it was held.

### Y. M. C. A. BASEBALL SCHEDULE OPENS 25TH OF APRIL

The board of control of the Y. M. C. A. Athletic league met last night to make definite plans for the opening of the season. Four church teams are in the race in both the Junior and Senior leagues. The schedule will begin Tuesday, April 25 and two games per week will be played on Tuesdays and Fridays. Junior games will be called at 4:15 and senior games at 6:15 p. m. Teams must have at least seven men on the field ready to play within fifteen minutes after the starting time or forfeit the game.

During the first six games, or up to and including May 12, official games shall consist of seven innings. Beginning with May 16 regular nine inning games shall be official. Each team competing must furnish one umpire. The age limit in the Junior league was raised to 16 years, the age on Jan. 1, 1922 determining. If sixteen or over on Jan. 1 the player will be regarded as a Senior and cannot compete in the Junior league.

Players on any team must be registered in the Sunday School or Young Peoples' society of the church they represent at least one Sunday before the opening of the schedule. Eligibility thereafter is maintained by attendance at least three times per month. Players entering after the opening of the season must attend at least twice on successive Sundays before competing.

Steps will be taken to secure a pennant or some sort of recognition for the winning teams.
