V. H. Vawter was elected president of the Medford chamber of commerce last evening by the board of directors. Mr. Vawter was reluctant to accept the honor because of its many duties which he believed he could not perform in view of the fact that his private interests demanded more of his attention. He was practically drafted and realizing his community responsibility he accepted.

In public affairs V. H. Vawter has been one of the most active citizens of Medford. No movement of any consequence during the past five years having as its object the welfare of the Rogue River valley that has not had his active support. He was elected president of the old commercial club and served the six months prior to the reorganization of that body into the present chamber of commerce. The improvement of the Medford-Crater Lake highway and hotel accommodations at the park have been his hobby. As a regent of the University of Oregon he is held in the very highest esteem by his associates and everyone in Medford has known him as the efficient cashier of the Jackson County bank.

H. L. Walther, district manager of the California-Oregon Power Co., was re-elected vice president. His work for the betterment of community affairs is well known to the citizens of Medford and his temperament is of such a character that he is unsatisfied unless he is actively at work on some civic problem.

B. E. Harder, president of the First National bank was elected treasurer. The directors have come to recognize the ability of Mr. Harder as a civic worker. He is a comparatively new man in the community, yet in his short residence here he has made many friends. As president of the Baker chamber of commerce and a director of that organization for many years, he brings with him an experience which is most valuable to the local organization.

The secretary, H. O. Frohbach, was re-elected. This being the third term of his service to the community.

**BIG SONG HITS
