WITNESS ADMITS ALIBI TESTIMONY FIXED BY DEFENSE

WENATCHEE, Wash., April 14.—The alibi the defense is trying to prove for Ray Bigelow, who with Everett Bozarth, is charged with murdering Jacob Weber on November 26, underwent a heavy bombardment last night before Judge Bell. The biggest sensation of the trial came when Deputy Prosecutor Lebeck obtained an admission from May Coles, witness for the defense, that Mrs. Bigelow, grandmother of one of the accused boys, suggested that she change a certain part of her testimony to fit in with them of Miss Gladys Latham, another witness.

Attorney Lebeck asked: "Did you ever talk the matter over with Mrs. Bigelow with reference to the time you girls met Ray on the street?" Miss Coles answered yes. "Did she suggest you were mistaken as to the time?" "Yes." "Told you that you would have to change the time fifteen minutes?" "Yes." The defense is trying to show the boys were downtown at the time of the shooting which is supposed to have taken place between 5 and 5:30 p. m.

INJUNCTION IS GRANTED AGAIN AGAINST STRIKE

CHARLESTON, W. Va., April 14.—An injunction was granted in the United States district court here today by Judge George W. McClintic to restrain the United Mine Workers of America from further efforts to organize the non-union miners employed by the McKell Coal company and three other companies of Fayette and Raleigh counties, West Virginia.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Attorney General Daugherty, leaving the White House today after reporting to President Harding on his recent trip to Indianapolis, said he had received the impression that "preliminary and local conferences" were going on among the operators and union officials but no progress has yet been made. He declined to elaborate on the statement.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 14.—Commenting on the statement of Attorney General Daugherty, given out in Washington that "preliminary and local conferences" are going on among operators and miners, President John L. Lewis of the United Mine Workers at his home here declared positively that "no conferences at all are in progress." "Please say for me," Mr. Lewis repeated, "that no conferences are in progress and none in prospect."

CLEANSE COLLEGE ATHLETICS, WORD OF COMMISSION

COLUMBUS, April 14.—(By the Associated Press)—Cleanse college athletics of "commercialism and professionalism," and "make them the servant and not the master of college life."

This is the major recommendation of the commission on athletics of the commission of the Ohio college presidents and deans submitted at the annual meeting by Dr. Edward S. Parson, president of Marietta college, chairman. The commission's report follows a year's investigation into every phase of college athletic activity. Eight major recommendations are made. The others are: Limit participation in athletics to those who honestly have met proper scholastic standards. Development of intra-mural athletics. Standardization of schedules and the like of football, basketball and baseball so they may not seriously encroach upon the work of the college curriculum. Do away with competition of colleges for athletic material from high schools and other preparatory schools.

FEDERAL RESERVE REDUCES DISCOUNT

Heretofore only women have been isolated, the men being released.

WIFE MURDERED, MAN SUICIDES, ON TRIAL RESULT

NEW YORK, April 14.—Another sensation growing out of the sensational murder of Dr. Abraham Glickstein by Mrs. Lillian Ratzen in Brooklyn last December was recorded today when his widow, Mrs. Anna Glickstein ended her life by leaping out of the third story window of her mother's home in Brooklyn. The doctor's mother dropped dead at his funeral. Mrs. Glickstein had been laboring under a heavy mental strain since her husband was shot, members of the family indicated, and it was said she had been brooding over the recent acquittal of Olivia M. Stone of a charge of murder. Mrs. Lena Tubansky, mother of Mrs. Glickstein, said that at the time of Miss Stone's trial her daughter exclaimed: "If the Stone woman goes free the woman who killed my husband will go free, anyway, as long as the doctor is dead, I might as well be dead myself." Mrs. Glickstein's head had struck an iron post at the entrance to the house.

STENOGRAPHER IS GAY ACCOMPLICE IN N. Y. ROBBERIES

NEW YORK, April 14.—A story of a gang of safeblowers, working with the aid of a girl stenographer used as a scout, today was obtained by detectives investigating last night's raid on the Royal Insurance company building at 84 William street, in which nearly \$75,000 worth of cash and securities were taken from a number of offices. The police claimed to have obtained the story from George Breckenridge, a watchman, who was found bound and gagged. According to detectives, Breckenridge confessed to being a party to the robberies and unfolded a plot for systematic entering of large office buildings, in which the girl, a sweetheart of one of the band, played an important role. The girl would obtain employment in one of the offices, chosen by the gang, make plans of the building and learn the method of handling the money. Then she would turn her information over to the bandit lover and resign, according to the police, sharing in the loot when the gang did the job.
