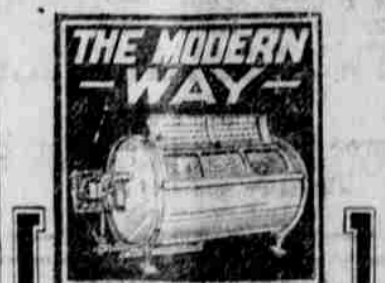

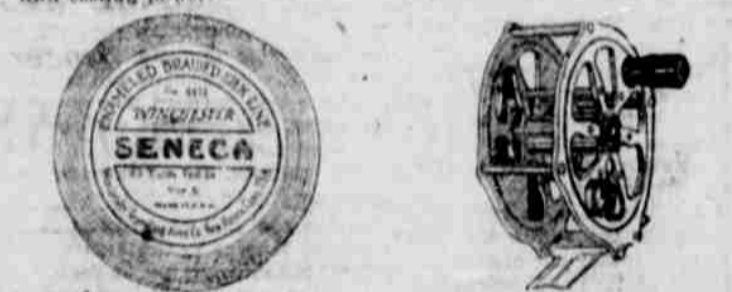

HUGHES WRITES CUT
IN NAVY 'INJURIOUS'

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Reduction of naval personnel to 67,000 enlisted men as provided in the naval appropriation bill now being considered by the house, would reduce the American navy below the 5-5-3 ratio established by the arms conference and "would be most injurious to the interests of the United States," Secretary Hughes today wrote Representative Rogers, republican, Massachusetts.
