

MANY FEATURES FIRST METHODIST EASTER SERVICES

"We are confidently expecting the greatest day in the history of our church," said Rev. J. R. Barnett today in commenting on plans for observance of Easter at the First Methodist Episcopal church.

The pastor continued, "People come to church on Easter, expecting the exceptional in music, and we have made preparations to meet the highest expectations in this line. At the morning service one of Ashford's best anthems, 'The Shout of Victory,' will be sung by the vested choir, with Mrs. Van Scoyoc and Mr. MacDonough having the solo parts. The solo for this service will be 'Easter Dawn' one of Woodman's his successes. This number will be sung by Mrs. Pierce.

Of especial interest to music lovers will be the Easter musical service being held at eight o'clock in the evening. Our vested choir will present 'Pavane Cantata,' 'The Gospel of Easter.'

Speaking of other features of the day Mr. Barnett said: "It will be a full day for us. The young people have planned a sunrise prayer meeting out on the heights near the reservoir. They will meet at the church at 6:30 a. m. and go in a body. Following the service they will return to the church where breakfast will be served.

The Sunday school service will be of a very unusual character, parents attending with their children, and after an address by Dr. Harcourt W. Peck the sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be administered.

As to the eleven o'clock service the pastor said, "We are very fortunate in having with us Dr. Harcourt W. Peck to preach the Easter sermon. His subject will be 'The Living Christ.' There have been requests for the christening of children at this service, so we have planned for the sacrament of Baptism, and parents will have the privilege of presenting their children for this purpose. There will be opportunity also for those desiring to unite with the church to do so at this time.

"The closing evangelistic service of the revival will be held at 8:30 p. m. in the auditorium of the church. Dr. Peck will preach on 'The Final Judgment,' and we confidently expect this to be the climactic service of the revival campaign."

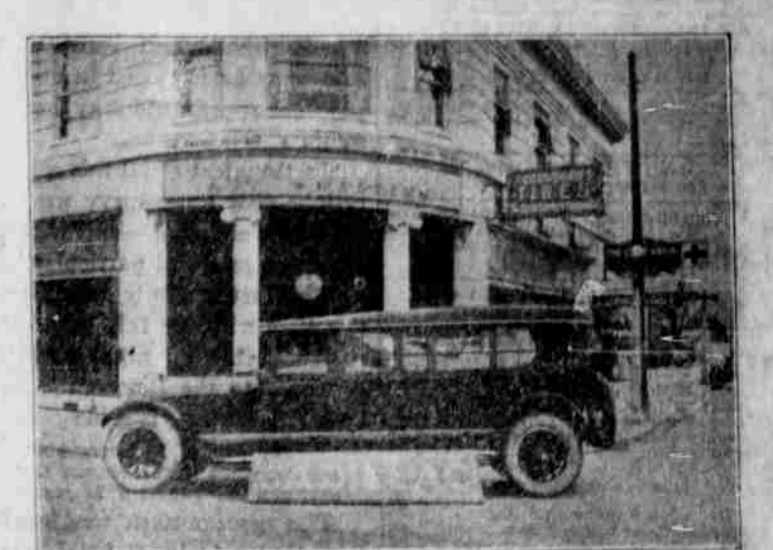

The accompanying photograph shows a new Cadillac touring car converted into a twelve passenger auto stage which will be used on the run from Medford, Oregon, across the Cascade Mountain range to Klamath Falls, Oregon.
