REPRESENTATIVE STATE CHAMBER TO SPEAK, FORUM

The manager of the new organization and service department of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, M. J. Duryea, will address the members' forum of the Medford Chamber of Commerce next Wednesday.

After an absence of some five years, Mr. Duryea returns to Oregon with an experience that fits him to administer the affairs of this new department, which is to give aid to chambers of commerce and commercial clubs to become more effective institutions in their respective communities.

The secretaries of commercial organizations of Oregon at their convention a year ago, realizing the necessity of building up commercial organizations of the state, petitioned the state chamber of commerce to inaugurate such a service. This has been done, and by T. Bishop of Portland, a director of the state chamber, is the department head. M. J. Duryea is no stranger to Oregon, nor are the resources of Oregon unfamiliar to him, as he was a resident of the state for a number of years and served the Eugene Chamber of Commerce as its secretary. He also was for a time the publicity manager of the Ashland Springs Water commission, and during his residence in Southern Oregon, made many friends.

ASHLAND LAUNCHES DEVELOPMENT OF POTTERY INDUSTRY

ASHLAND, April 17.—The white cliffs northeast of town, prominently visible on the borders of the Dead Indian section, are about to come into their own by way of supplying a product eminently adapted to pottery manufacture. This announcement is nothing new, the chalky deposits having been known for years, while their merits have been the subject of conjecture without exploitation. Samples of the material—technically known as kaolin—have been sent to Portland from the Hooper ranch, the same being forwarded under chamber of commerce auspices for the purpose of testing their qualities as adjuncts in the making of pottery. The supply from the Dead Indian country is said to be limitless. Now if we can get this kaolin to functioning, in addition to the inexhaustible supply of granite from the Blair quarries, also other important assets, plus notable improvements on a big scale incorporating the new hotel and sanitarium located in the city proper, then and not till then will there be a renaissance of public improvements commensurate with the numerous advantages existing both in Ashland and the surrounding country tributary to it.

Mrs. Ann Russell, octogenarian pioneer of this locality, was signally honored on the occasion of her 84th birthday, which occurred April 14, by a family reunion held at the home of her daughter, Mrs. O. Winter, on the Boulevard. A dozen or more relatives, including representatives of three generations, were present to participate in the festivities. The observance was really a composite one, inasmuch as the birthday anniversaries of a daughter-in-law and grandson, occurring on nearly the same date, were also celebrated at this happy gathering.

Hart & Cushing, of Portland, are the new proprietors of the Vining theatre, having purchased the Bergerer interests in this playhouse which is the only one in town.

Ed Andrews, now appearing in comic opera in San Francisco, received a highly complimentary criticism in a recent number of the Argonaut of that city, a periodical which is authority on matters political, financial, and musical, also society as pertaining to its "upper crust." Ed is filling the old familiar role of Ko-Ko in the Mikado, a comic creation of which, like Pinafore, people seem never to tire.

A pipe dream is again being indulged in regarding a new state of Lincoln, to be carved out of southern Oregon and northern California, the capital of which is to be Medford, that city in recognition of this honor, to relinquish all claims of becoming the future county seat of Jackson in favor of Ashland. It will take more than a referendum to settle this matter.

With a superabundance of fraternalisms here already, efforts are being made to revive Pythianism, which flourished here years ago and became extinct. Better merge with the strong following of the order at Medford, rather than add to the surfeit of isms permanently established hereabouts.

Word has reached Ashland of the death recently, at Payette, Idaho, of Mrs. C. H. Robertson, former resident of this vicinity. Mr. Robertson developed the Square Deal orchard property years ago, across Bear creek, and for sometime past has been connected with fruit association activities in Idaho.

Last Thursday reminded one of war times, many soldier boys being in evidence on their way to new assignments at Camp Lewis from southern garrisons, and during the train stop took occasion to hike up town by way of exercise. Fine looking fellows made up the detachment.

Caroline Tilton, Catherine Pettenger, John Galey, Ruth Fifield, Marjorie Edson and Alwa Doran, high school pupils, have been cited as honor students for a six weeks period ending recently, a distinction awarded to pupils in higher classes, who having pursued a course of not less than four regular subjects, win ninety per cent therein, or at least a like percentage in citizenship grade. Harold Simpson and Verne Blue, Ashland attendants at the state university, are also classified as honor students at that institution.

Funeral services of the late Mrs. Nellie Darling, who died in this city April 13, were held at Gold Hill on Sunday afternoon, interment being in the cemetery of that locality. The deceased was the widow of Wm. Darling and had been a resident of Oregon for over 30 years. She leaves four sons, one of whom is C. C. Darling, local photographer.

A novel observance of Good Friday, from a Protestant standpoint, occurred at Susanville, Calif., where business houses and schools were closed in the afternoon, the pastors of three denominations joining in a union service held at the theatre.

Engineer Charley Winne is home again from an enforced vacation passed at the Southern Pacific hospital in San Francisco, due to serious illness.

W. H. Hodgkinson has resigned as consul of the Modern Woodman camp, and F. L. Nutter has been elected to fill the vacancy until the end of the
