

### DIM LIGHTS OR PAY A FINE, IS OFFICIAL EDICT

All motorists of Medford and vicinity are warned if they desire to escape paying fines to strictly adhere to the state law which compels the dimming of lights on approaching another motor vehicle.

Two of the offenders, Frank Holzgang and Lloyd A. Moss, were fined \$10 each because they violated this law in the country district, both violations having occurred between Medford and Jacksonville.

G. E. Bahr, a traveling salesman from Portland, was found guilty at his trial today before Judge Taylor of speeding on West Main street, in the wake of the fire department which was en route to a fire Saturday, and was fined \$25 and costs.

When arrested by Deputy State Motor Traffic Officer McMahon, whose speedometer showed that he was speeding along behind the department at 30 miles or over, Bahr got into a wordy argument with McMahon and refused to say whether or not he would report for trial in police court today.

### MODOC ORCHARD FIRST TO SMUDGE, FROST TOMORROW

These are frost worrying days for the orchardists of the Rogue River valley, who fortunately escaped predicted killing frosts Sunday and Monday mornings, but must again face a prediction of a heavy to killing frost tomorrow morning.

Last night was a hard one for Floyd Young, the government frost expert stationed here, to dope out, because of a high barometer, which was still rising in connection with peculiar weather data.

Only one orchard smudged this morning, and that was the Modoc, whose pear trees are several days further advanced in their buds than the rest of the valley.

A temperature of 23 means several degrees lower on the floor of the valley. Mr. Young and County Agent Cate spent today in going over the valley, examining the condition of the buds, in order to gather knowledge of how the low temperature of this morning affected the buds, so as to guide them in giving future frost warnings.
